Anyway, he survived and is flourishing - we won't tell the SPCA, will we?


Two days later, puppy Luke was completely listless and wouldn't eat (and he's normally a little pig). We just gave him love and attention, and he recovered after a few days!

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





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# MERIDIANI

It's been four years since we first met with KATHY DUNDERDALE. Back then, she and her family – husband Ian and children Chloe and Alex – were six years into their Singapore stay and living in a three-storey house in Coronation Road. Now they live in a Sentosa condo and have a 44-foot sailboat in the marina.



# An art to walk on ...



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The living room style is predominantly white, modern and clean, with pops of colour. For Kathy, the main feature is the view, with the bustling traffic of boats and planes across the waves. arrive at Kathy and lan's Sentosa Cove waterfront condo and am whisked directly from the lift into their living room, with its panoramic views across the water. "The landscape changes so much when you look out – it's like a moving canvas," says Kathy. "You can sometimes spot your friends out there on their boats, and it's just amazing when you see the lightning shows across the water."

The family's aquatic interests don't stop at sitting on the balcony and watching the boats go by, or indeed the lightning strike. Kathy and lan invested in a two-bedroom, 44-foot Jeaneau sailboat, *Vesper 7*, after moving to The Cove five years ago.

"lan ordered the boat without knowing how to sail; but when he puts his mind to something he just does it, and he took the courses and passed his exams before the sailboat arrived," says Kathy. "Getting a boat is definitely a lifestyle choice. It's an investment that has to be maintained, as when you live on the sea, things disintegrate fast. The trade-off is that we get to sail every weekend."

#### Landed interests

With the help of daughter Chloe, an art history graduate, Kathy and Ian have become dedicated art collectors. "Dad began collecting purely what he liked, but he has now progressed towards making the collection better," says Chloe. Kathy and Chloe show me their most recent acquisition, a large piece by Indonesian artist, Heri Dono. "This was one of his last mixed-media pieces, as he has now moved on to sculpture. We worked with Equator Art Projects at Gilman Barracks to acquire this piece," Chloe explains.

The apartment is covered with an eclectic mix of artwork and accessories – unsurprising, as Kathy herself has lived the expat life for 35 years in a multitude of different countries. The family's most recent move from Coronation Road saw her sell and give away some pieces of furniture, put other pieces in storage, and call on designer Chloe Elkerton who now runs E&A Interiors to furnish the Sentosa condo. The result is an interesting mix.

Kathy also conducts her Jin Shin Jyutsu practice from her treatment room in the apartment, and has a strong base of regular clients. "I've being doing this work now for 15 years. The progressive Singapore medical community is increasingly looking for complementary therapies," she tells me. Jin Shin Jyutsu, she explains, is a highly refined form of acupressure that can release the cause of acute and chronic conditions, restore emotional balance, increase energy and calm the body.

#### Home Style

When I ask Kathy about her personal style, she says she's completely down the middle. "I can be classic Chanel up and down, but then I can also be boho. Some days I'll be very pearly and put together, and other days more relaxed." This style is reflected in her surroundings, too, and that – mixed with the rest of the family's interests and influences – makes for a fascinating home.



#### The boat

"We didn't want anything too big as we would just be going out on her on the weekends. She's two years old, has a light interior that's all custom-made, and a great sound system. It's so nice to be out there on the sea; it's relaxing and calm, and it's your little home. The vistas are amazing when you sit out on deck, and we've had plenty of fun weekends sailing, even participating in the Neptune Regatta – a race to the Equator – last year." – *Kathy* 



#### The name

"We named the boat Vesper 7 for many reasons. We're big James Bond fans - we've seen every Bond movie hundreds of times. Our parents' favourite cocktail is the Vesper martini, which James Bond introduces to the character Vesper Lynd in Casino Royale. The Latin word vesper means evening, which is when we intended to use the boat the most. The name also relates to the actress Eva Green, who played Vesper Lynd, and who went to my university, The American University in Paris. Finally, because there's another boat named Vesper in Singapore, she got the number 7, as in 007." - Chloe



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


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
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




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# DISPLAY

If your favourite knickknacks and accessories are plonked on a shelf collecting dust, read on to get tips and advice from the experts on displaying them, from the new and funky to the more traditional.



ingapore is a veritable goldmine as far as furniture is concerned, so there are plenty of beautiful shelves, consoles and other display units to choose from. Whether you're going for a chic European look or a more natural, Asian feel, the perfect piece to show off that special something is out there waiting for you.



### **Contemporary Ideas**

If you enjoy trawling around Great World City, then you've no doubt stumbled across **Lifestorey**, and it's really worth visiting the huge Lifestorey showroom on Tai Seng Street to view a much wider choice of products.

"We source from all over the world and have a very good mix from Europe, including from Denmark, Italy and Germany; we also feature local designers," says business development manager **Lawrence Yong**.

"We currently have a very versatile Danish collection called Muuto – New Nordic. You can stack its individual cubby shelves any way you like. Because they're modular, you can keep adding to or taking away from your structure, depending on the size of your space."

Lawrence uses the Flynt brand in the store's current collection as another example of great display furniture. Now manufactured in Indonesia using tropical wood (after the French company realised its wood wasn't holding up in our humid climate), the furniture has a raw, industrial look, and is finished with old-fashioned fridge handles on the doors of its consoles.

"The tricks I use to highlight the accessories in our store are mainly to do with colour," says Lawrence. "When we place accessories on a shelf, we try to use something large as a focal point, with smaller things surrounding it. If you have a lot of white, put bold pieces in between. Similarly, if you have bright walls or a brightly coloured shelving unit, you should display accessories with muted colours, otherwise they will be clashing all over the place."



### **DISPLAY FURNITURE**



#### Large Pieces

If you're lucky enough to have a large space that dwarfs small furniture, **Nirvana Gallery** has some perfect pieces that are not only big but would fit nicely into a more rustic environment, such as an original colonial house.

"Most of our furniture is from Burma, because we have a factory there. Our artwork is from Indonesia and Mexico," says store manager Thomas Tan, who uses large teak benches to display the work.

Contrasting with the vibrancy of the colours in the paintings, the dark-wood benches are great for holding colourful accessories. It's important, he feels, to have a nice piece of furniture on which to display a piece and make it the centre of attraction.

Nirvana has an extensive collection of solid rosewood, teak and *thinwin* furniture, including tables and benches made from huge chunks of bark and trunk. They're an unusual and stunning way to showcase something special, and they even work as display pieces on their own; the furniture is about as rustic as you'll find.

"Wood makes us feel closer to nature," says Thomas. "An unfinished-looking concrete floor complements our wooden furniture well. If we put carpet down, it wouldn't really work."



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### **Creative Cubbies**

Shelving units are an obvious choice for storing accessories and the like, but rather than settling for something runof-the-mill, why not opt for one of the many creative pieces on the market at the moment? For instance, **Pure Interior** carries some interesting cubby shelves that can be used to divide your room and display accessories.

The key to an eye-catching display, says the Pure Interior team, is colour. For example, using all red accessories on grey shelves can create a beautiful ensemble; similarly, white and black pieces on white shelves. Keeping to one colour prevents a cluttered feel and helps make your cubbies the focal point of the room.

Architect and interior designer **Paula Ferraresso** from Kemistry of Style works alongside Pure Interior in selecting its pieces and styling its showroom. She shared a few of her display tricks with us.

"If you put a nice piece in a boring place, you can't always feel the difference between that piece and another. First, decide on what you want your focal point to be in the room. If you want to emphasise the effect of an object, you could place it in front of a mirror, or make sure it's well lit, or even put it on a glass shelf. You should also place it near other objects that bring out the best in it."

Paula points to the current European trend of buying 1980s or even 1940s

pieces and putting them in a classic environment, though it's not so simple in Singapore where there's a shortage of retro or vintage furniture shops. "You can have colourful plastic pieces inside a classic interior; it just takes some skill to mix old and new in this way."





#### Simple Solutions

Another way of highlighting something special is to place it on something simple. **Teak Avenue**'s Burmese pieces are solid, well made and fairly basic, some with rough, unfinished edges that give a more rustic look.

If you're looking for a display cabinet with glass doors, shelving units or a high console to discourage little hands from reaching for your special things, you'll find an extensive range here.

Managing director **Win Ko Ko Thaung** says, "I use a teak display cabinet with an enclosed glass case to display important pieces, with a mirror and glass shelving, so there's no dust. Your art is better enhanced if it's displayed simply. People often prefer their timber furniture to be simple, as it makes them feel closer to nature.

"Teak is renowned in Asia for its beauty and durability. All of my pieces are solid, and I try to make their designs very plain so that they fit with any interior. I've found that certain rustic pieces are particularly popular."

Maintenance is easy, too; the protective coating that Ko uses means that a quick wipe with a damp cloth is all that's required to clean them. "Everything here is designed for both indoor and outdoor use, and can last 30 to 40 years in any weather. Our strong points are the quality of the wood and the all-natural colours. I don't use any colour adjustments. You can also feel that it's natural."

A husband-and-wife team tells us about moving to Singapore and explains how they maintain a harmonious relationship while running their lacquer home décor business together. aving begun their expat experience in 1995 with an assignment from their home country France to Hong Kong, the Phams spent the subsequent 19 years living in a variety of Asian countries. It's unsurprising, then, that Tuyet-Mai and Hung's four-bedroom River Valley apartment is crammed full of interesting and eye-catching Asian furniture and accessories. The pieces range from large Vietnamese lacquer pictures to furniture acquired during stints in Guangzhou, Vietnam and Shanghai.

The couple is of French-Vietnamese descent; Hung left Vietnam when he was two years old, and Tuyet-Mai when she was 11. They both lived in Paris. "Our parents were in the medical profession, and we hung out in similar circles. We didn't actually know each other as children, but met later at a party," explains Tuyet-Mai.



After Hong Kong came postings to Guangzhou, Shanghai, Vietnam and Shanghai again, before they arrived in Singapore in August last year. Along the way, they had three children. Son Khoi (17) was born in Hong Kong, elder daughter Mai-Khanh (15) in France, and Mai-Khue (5) in Shanghai.

The family chose this four-bedroom apartment close to Orchard Road as their Singapore home; Tuyet-Mai says its safe and central location were deciding factors. "We'd lived in a house for many years, but we felt that it was time to move back into an apartment. It's so much easier when you go away; you just lock the door and walk away. You don't have to shut up the whole house," she explains.

"We need a big space as we have a lot of furniture, so we didn't mind moving into an old condo because we knew we'd get more room."

From the family room window, Tuyet-Mai points out the views of the back of Takashimaya, and of course Orchard Road. Despite the plethora of shopping, bars and restaurants close by, the couple are still spending most of their time working on their business venture. "We haven't had the chance to enjoy Singapore much yet, and any spare time we do have is spent with the children."

### Working together

Tuyet-Mai set up Mai Home Décor in 2006 while the family was living in Vietnam. She started off with lamps, only more recently adding other accessories and furniture. "Lacquerware is something very well known in Vietnam; it involves an ancient technique, and I like the fact that the pieces are handmade. The concept we had for our products was to have decorative lamps that can bring style to your home," she says. The lamps in their own home are a mix of Art Deco, contemporary, and Chinese influences. All sit neatly against their own furniture.

Deciding to bring his 20-year career with a Swedish multinational to an end, Hung recently joined his wife to help build up their business. The obvious question is: what is it like working together as a married couple? "We share everything and we talk about everything," says Tuyet-Mai. "Hung takes care of the strategy and I work more on the commercial and clientele side. There are definitely things that he does much better than me. I couldn't handle the business on my own anymore, so having him 100 percent here with me is really helpful."

The lamps fit high safety standards, and even the lampshades are flame retardant.

## The lowdown on lacquer

Lacquer is the sap from the lacquer tree (Toxicodendron vernicifluum), which grows only in East Asia. To harvest it, grooves are cut in the bark, and the sap that oozes out is then collected in bowls. Next, the sap is put into large bamboo barrels that are sealed so as to be airtight, and left for several months in a cool, dark, airy place. The resin settles into layers that are separated and filtered to remove impurities.

To lacquer an object, it is coated with layer upon layer of lacquer, each layer left to dry for about two days. The finished products are extremely hardy and durable.

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
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


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
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Sitting comfortably with hands resting protectively on her pregnant tummy, Terri-Anne Leske glows with the healthy radiance that is synonymous with women in particular stages of pregnancy. She explains that this four-bedroom Siglap house was the first and only property they viewed, after two years in a tiny River Valley condo, and that it's an ideal fit for their growing family. The family has settled easily into a more relaxed lifestyle since moving to the East Coast in March.

"The house is perfect," says Terri-Anne. "While the kitchen is the star attraction for me, my two-year-old twins Eli and Olivia love having so much space in which to race around; they didn't have that in the condo."



Terri-Anne is from Australia, and it was coincidentally an Aussie architect who renovated the house. Among its features is an open and airy kitchen, ideal for this cooking enthusiast. "I love to leave the front and back doors open, so the kids can run through while I'm cooking; it works well for all of us."

Spread across three levels, the house has a light and spacious ground floor with kitchen, living and dining rooms. "This downstairs space is great for dinner parties; with the children tucked up in bed, we can be as loud as we want without disturbing them. 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hile the debate continues as to whether the government should tweak some of its cooling measures, luxury apartment prices that were holding their own have finally started to soften. Luxury developers are now looking to bulk buyers as well as offering discounted prices and ABSD (Additional Buyer's Stamp Duty) rebates to boost dwindling sales.

Although luxury purchases by foreigners have been steadily falling (the first half of 2013 saw 36 luxury units sold; the same period in 2014 just 14), there is optimism that this might improve with recent pricesoftening in this market segment. Times are tough for developers; their profit margins have approximately halved as take-up rates continue to fall island-wide and construction and financing costs increase.

Continuing downward pressure on rentals is assisted by a reduction in the influx of foreigners and more supply. There's noticeably less demand for properties that rent at above \$10k a month, as cost-conscious companies step away from corporate leasing – preferring to give their employees set packages with which to plan their own accommodation, schooling and car hire. Employees are therefore seeking to save costs by choosing less expensive accommodation. A note to tenants: it's a great time to lock in a good deal.







### What's in a name?

Haig Road connects Changi and Geylang Roads with East Coast Road. It's named after Field Marshal Douglas Haig, Commander-in-Chief of the British expeditionary forces in France in World War I. In the early 19th century, the road was part of a large coconut plantation. Whitewashed government quarters, used by soldiers during the Japanese occupation, are a low-key feature of Haig Road, near Jalan Tembusu.

Around the 1950s it was known as Kampong Serani, a reference to the many Eurasians living in the village (the word Serani refers to Christians), and a landmark for taxi drivers and trishaw riders.

More than just happy snappers, these four professional photographers nominate their favourite images for us, and explain how they achieved the perfect shot.



### BAOBAB PHOTOGRAPHY SCHOOL Photographer: Karen Lucas

This was taken during last year's photography tour to the Angkor temples around Siem Reap and the nearby village communities. We'd just arrived and were the only visitors at Preah Khan, a fabulous temple to explore and photograph at dawn, and we noticed the pretty sunrise over the surrounding countryside. After I explained which technical settings to use to capture the scene, I noticed that all the photographers were lined up and realised they'd make a great silhouette. I asked them to turn sideways and *voil*à! – a great souvenir for everyone.

A low ISO of 320 helped to ensure great image quality and a wide aperture of f4 blurred the background. I underexposed by-2 stops to make the silhouettes darker and added a Cloudy White Balance to boost the yellows and oranges of the sky. For the finishing touch, I increased contrast and vibrancy in Lightroom.

Over the course of nine trips in the past seven years, I've fallen in love with Cambodia, its incredible temples and amazing people. Sharing this special place with a great group of people who love to travel and love to take photos is the highlight of my year, and this photo is a lovely reminder of how photographing in Cambodia is full of happy surprises and great moments.

We teach a range of photography classes for all levels and offer yearly photography tours to Myanmar, Bhutan and Cambodia. When I'm teaching, especially on a tour, I spend most of my time helping with technical settings, explaining how to best use the available light and demonstrating how to get more creative with shots. We make a final photo book with everyone's best shots after the tour!

### SEALEY BRANDT PHOTOGRAPHY

This image was taken at my studio. I was commissioned by a client to produce an acting portfolio for her daughter and this is just one out of the series that I love.

My speciality is shooting with black-and-white film, as the grain in negative film is beautiful – very different to digital. All my prints are printed in Australia at my father's old lab. I have samples of both printing methods to show clients prior to the shoot so that they can decide which they prefer.

With 30 years of experience, I never need to re-touch and rarely need to crop any of my images as I get the shots I want in the camera every time. In saying that, I do offer re-touching services when digital format is chosen, if that's what a client wants or needs. If you make a person feel great in front of the camera, though, the image will always be good, as their beauty comes out and their personality shines.

This image is one of my favourites. I love the in-between moment and how her strength is portrayed. It makes me stop and look at it every time. This is typical of my photographic work. I have been photographing people for over 30 years, and, most importantly, families and children for 15 years. I also love to travel to unusual places, photographing the landscapes and the people, and the way they live. Images from Mongolia that I shot last year document the vast lands of that country and were recently shown at a photo fair in Milan, Italy. I'm also exhibiting at the Milan Image and Design Art Fair at Singapore's Marina Bay Sands from 24 to 26 October.

### MICHAEL GRONOW PHOTOGRAPHY

This is a photo of my son, James, taken in the studio at the end of last year. I'm constantly trying out new poses or lighting setups and James is often a good test subject (after the odd bribe or two!).

I use up to four lights when taking portraits of children. For this photo, I used two lights in a slightly unusual setup. James is sitting on a chair with a black wall close behind him. The main light is a large soft-box, very close to James and to the right of the camera. On the left of James (out of shot) is a large, black foam-board to strengthen the shadows on that side of his face. Another light is placed behind this foam-board, and angled so that it bounces a small amount of light off the black wall and back onto the very right of James' face. This gives the portrait a much more three-dimensional look. The photo was converted into black-and-white using Photoshop.

I have a few tricks up my sleeve to get natural smiles out of children, and this shot really encapsulates James' personality, which is why it is one of my favourites.

It is typical of the type of photographs of children and families taken at the studio. The other side to my business is specialist makeover photography for women, as well as headshots and business portraits.

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Undertaking an international move is a necessity for many families – especially when a parent gets an offer they can't refuse. Although stressful, it's often a big adventure for the grownups and a chance for a fresh start. Unfortunately, instead of our kids being equally enthusiastic, some of them have to be dragged kicking and screaming across the globe. What should one do in these cases? We spoke with **Dover Court Preparatory School**'s Director of Educational Services, DR MAUREEN ROACH, and Regional Commercial Manager, RICHARD DAVIES, to find out what types of challenges our kids might face.

### Do children of different ages cope differently?

*Maureen:* Yes, they do, and it's important for schools to watch out for the signs. Some children become quiet and withdrawn, others tearful; sometimes behavioural difficulties are displayed; work standards can temporarily decline; others have frequent stomach aches, headaches and other minor symptoms that cannot be explained medically.

*Richard:* It's interesting; it seems to be the 12- to 15-year-olds who suffer most, because at that age they're developing strong friendship groups. In my experience of moving around to each of our schools, they're always located in really cool cities with lots to do, so the students generally settle in quickly.

The new curriculum and the grade or year that the child is going into can also cause disruption. Lots of parents think that if they're sending their kids to a British school, it'll be the same as the one back home. While there are going to be consistencies, the curriculum and topics they study can be vastly different. That can cause problems in the upper years, especially if you're a student moving school halfway through your GCSEs, as you may not have the same choices. It's important, first and foremost, to understand the curriculum.

# What about age differences within each class?

*Richard:* In an international context, age difference in class is not awkward or unusual for kids. Moving from the US curriculum to the British is a great example, because the British curriculum is a 13-year curriculum and the US one is a 12-grade curriculum. The equivalent of the US Grade 2 is Year 3 in the British system. So when an American family moves to the British system their child should not go from Grade 2 to Year 2. It can cause a bit of confusion.

#### Different countries also start term at different times of year, don't they?

Richard: Yes, most Australian schools start in January and finish in December. That can cause issues in terms of equivalency and age-appropriateness. The British schools are based on ageappropriateness and they're very clear about what level a child should be performing at, according to their age. Here we assess the child to see if they're capable of being in their age-appropriate year, because our priority is to try to put children of the same age together. If we find that the child has been in the grade below and it's not the right thing to do, then we'll put them in the year below we do that after complete consultation with the parents, though.



# **10** WAYS DOVER COURT HELPS NEW CHILDREN ASSIMILATE

"We think it's important for all children to feel part of the school from the word go," says Maureen. Dover Court welcomes new students in myriad ways, including the following:

- 1. The class teacher meets every child on an individual basis the day before school begins.
- 2. For the first week of term, staff form a welcome committee on the front steps to greet all children and take them individually to their classrooms.
- Thereafter, they are welcomed by name each morning at the school entrance. If they still require it, they are accompanied to their room, or if they are more independent they are "buddied" with a friend.
- 4. Each new child is linked up with a buddy who has been in the school for some time and who knows its routines.
- 5. With younger children, issues of new friends, leaving behind other friends, grandparents, pets, and so on are addressed in Circle Time.
- 6. At playtime, the school council members set up play areas, approach children who may be alone or looking sad, and invite them to play.
- 7. At Upper Junior and Senior levels, topics of friendship, loss, grief and change are addressed through PSHE at tutor group time.
- 8. The entire Senior Department is taken to a residential camp within the first few weeks, where sessions on team building and facilitating friendships are held.
- 9. If children present themselves regularly at the nurse's station with headaches, stomach ache or other concerns, this is carefully monitored; the principal will chat with the child about his or her feelings about the new school, life in Singapore, missing friends, grandparents, pets, and so on.
- 10. Parents are alerted as sometimes these feelings may not be manifested or noticed.

### Maureen's tips for parents

- Discuss with your children the things that will be similar to home in the new location, and those that may be different.
- Assure them that the people they are leaving behind will be there when they return to their home country.
- Remind them that, through email, Skype and other online platforms, they will be able to keep contact with friends and family, talking to them regularly and seeing them onscreen.
- Let them know if grandparents may be able come over to visit them on holiday, and talk about the fun of acting as a guide to their visitors in the new country.

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
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# Skills for a SECURE FUTURE

With so many deserving charities calling out for help, it's inspiring to hear about an Indian-based organisation determined to self-fund its initiatives through the talents of the very people it aims to help.

adli is an outreach programme of i-India, an NGO established in 1993 that turns around the lives of impoverished and severely disadvantaged children who would otherwise have little chance of getting ahead. Working on a shoestring, Ladli is determined not to rely on charity, but rather to prove it can be a viable business, while training, paying and equipping participants for a bright future.

Ladli started out small, selling the jewellery and handicrafts made by its participants at fairs and exhibitions. But through support in Singapore and Norway, it has expanded to the point where it now produces clothing and jewellery under contract for retail and wholesale companies.

Filling retail and wholesale orders not only reaps financial benefits, it achieves Ladli's aim of empowering and educating the young adults and mothers at four vocational training centres in and around Jaipur, the capital of Rajasthan. As well as opportunities to earn a fair wage, participants have access to formal education, counselling and medical care. It's a win-win situation for some of India's incredibly poor, marginalised young people who started with nothing.

KARIN SCHULTE is a founding member of Street Child Project (SCP) in Singapore, a society that raises awareness of i-India and Ladli. Now a voluntary adviser to Ladli and SCP, Karin answered our questions about the great work being done.

#### Tell us how Ladli works.

The alternatives for the street youth and children who attend Ladli are begging, child labour – even prostitution. At Ladli, however, they learn to design jewellery, garments and handicrafts – all valuable skills in Jaipur. The Ladli environment is fun, safe and relaxed.

As many as 95 percent of participants attend regular schools, and some have gone on to colleges to study nursing, textile design and information technology. At the two boys' centres, they learn sewing and fabric printing, while the focus of the two girls centres is on jewellery-making. Jaipur is famous for its semi-precious gems.

Regardless of their ability and output, everyone enrolled at Ladli receives regular, fair incentives that are saved into individual bank accounts; plus, they get advice on good saving practices and wise financial habits. The concept of the Ladli programme is to empower participants through skill enhancement and financial security, with a taste of independence and ownership.

#### Shocking factory fires in Bangladesh last year turned the world's attention to the inhumane conditions in which many consumer products are made. They underlined the importance of ethical sourcing. Tell us, can consumers purchase from Ladli with confidence?

Some international clothing companies manufacture in countries with very low labour costs, where price pressures are

the main driver of inhumane working conditions, low pay and long working hours.

Ladli is not a production or manufacturing unit; rather, it's a social enterprise that promotes ownership, community, and a friendly working and learning environment. Participants receive fair incentives and profit shares; social workers are on hand for mentoring, education, and imparting life skills; meals, health checkups, recreation and entrepreneurial support are provided. As owners themselves, participants share the revenue, in the form of funding for education, which benefits their overall development, improves living standards and, importantly, extends the programme to reach other disadvantaged youth and women.

Over the past nine years, the organisation has established a project for domestic and overseas visitors and volunteers who want to engage in ethical tourism and fair trade, and to understand its positive and innovative approaches to the creation of social justice. #### Tell us about some Ladli success stories.

Mahaveer (22) joined Ladli a number of years ago and studied tailoring. His first contact with i-India was via its street school programme. He belongs to a nomadic community whose main occupation is working on construction sites or begging. Now working



full time at Ladli teaching and training new students, Mahaveer's skills provide him with a regular income that supports his family. Importantly, he has his own bank account and savings programme.



**Tulsi** (22) joined Ladli when she and her three siblings lost their parents. Through her work, she has been able to save money and is now studying nursing. She recently married a man who works with i-India's Child Helpline.

Hailing from one of the poorest slum areas of Jaipur, **Santosh** (21) has been involved with Ladli and i-India since 2000. She lost her parents in a road accident and was brought up by her elderly grandmother. Childhood polio

and lack of proper medical treatment relegated her to walking with crutches. Unable to perform tasks on her own, she was

plagued by guilt and distress at being a liability for her family. Under Ladli's outreach initiatives, Santosh received counselling and gained self-confidence by learning skills in jewellery-making and handicrafts. Now working at Ladli, her regular income and savings have allowed her to assist her poor family with daily food and health care, and she is saving money to invest in a secure future.



#### Where can we buy Ladli-produced products here?

Ladli is currently working with the brands Baliza, Stones that Rock and Tamarind Living. It hopes to expand the number of its clients, both here in Singapore and in other countries, to ensure Ladli's self-sufficiency. This is a unique way for the NGO and its participants to create value, and, they hope, secure income for reinvestment.

There are 130 local staff members on modest salaries; over 95 percent of donated funds are dedicated to its programmes. 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# Volunteer for Life - athome with Rosanne Woodmansee



he Woodmansees invested in this two-level Eastwood penthouse about seven years ago, Rosanne tells me. We're chatting over a cup of vanilla tea in the living room, sitting on 1930s lounge furniture that came from the antiques store at 51 Craig Road. You may have seen the sign above its door that famously warns: "We buy junk and sell antiques. Some fools buy and some fools sell."

Fortunately, husband Steve shares her taste for old and eclectic objects, and many of the *objets d'art* and knickknacks on the walls and elsewhere were picked up during his travels in the region. It was Steve's career that brought the family from Sydney to Southeast Asia, first to Penang in 2001 and then to Singapore in 2005.


"I loved Penang," says Rosanne. "I found it liberating. I'd never in my life imagined myself being so self-sufficient in a strange culture. As I wasn't allowed to work there, and the children were still fairly young – 13, 11 and 4 – I joined the International Women's Association (IWA) and made the most of my newfound free time."

Gina (now 16), the youngest of three daughters, is the only one left at home.

Fashion designer Emily (25) lives and works in Melbourne, while Laura (23) is pursuing her art studies in Berlin.

"Looking back," Rosanne reflects, "I realise how many doors volunteering has opened for me. Starting in Malaysia – and even back in my children's preschools in Australia – it has allowed me to meet so many different kinds of people that I would never have had the chance to meet otherwise. Whatever you do tends to open new doors. Editing the monthly IWA newsletter, for example, prompted me to join writers' groups when I came to Singapore."

#### How easily did you adjust to Singapore?

I took someone's advice to join two organisations: the ANZA writers' group and the Prime Time professional women's association. As an active member of the ANZA group for over four years, I made a number of good friends. And through them, I was introduced to the Friends of the Museums (FOM) and its writers' group.

I'll admit, it took me a year to feel fully at home in Singapore, but at FOM I again found the kind of multicultural, multiracial and diverse group I'd enjoyed mixing with in Penang. At first, I resisted doing the docent (guide) programme, because I didn't like speaking in public, but Agnes Gros convinced me to do it, if only to help me understand what I was seeing during my travels in the region. She was quite right, as I discovered later, when she and a couple of others visited Penang with me, to help me set up an FOM study tour there. They explained to me things I'd been looking at for years but never understood.

Soon after that, I joined the 14-week docent programme for the Peranakan Museum in Armenian Street and became a volunteer guide. That experience has been one of my great joys, really, as have the friendships that have sprung from it.

#### Do you still volunteer as a guide?

Since 2010, I've been a volunteer guide for the Preservation of Monuments and Sites Board – at the Istana on open days, in Telok Ayer Street and in Phillip Street; and now that Lau Pa Sat has re-opened after restoration I take walking tours there, too.

They're simply wonderful sites, each with a fascinating story. Knowing how they came to be, who designed them and who the communities were that used them – and being able to share all this knowledge – makes me feel more connected with Singapore, and less like a transitory guest.

#### What led to your setting up Five Foot Way Connections in 2011?

My business is aimed at helping newly arrived expats settle into Singapore, so it was a natural progression from my work

Period 13 July 2012 to 12 July 2016 as the Australian High Commission's community liaison officer. In that role, I had supported the diplomats and their families, advising them on practical matters such as schooling, how to make the most of the many social opportunities here, arranging exploratory walks and helping them to settle in.

#### Tell us more about your work.

As a cross-cultural and daily living training consultant, I provide many of the services I used to provide to the Australian diplomats and their families.

Before my clients even get here, I need to assess their family situation to see where they're most likely to need help. For some, it's schooling; and for a jet-lagged parent who is visiting for a couple of days just to look at schools, it's a boon to have someone like me drive them around, put what they hear and see into a context that they will understand, even help to interpret a strong accent.

Talking about the hiring of a helper can be a big conversation. I often recommend a pre-arrival teleconference on the practical and personal aspects of this decision.

#### You probably know as much as anyone about schooling in Singapore. How did that happen?

Again, part of my Australian High Commission role was to develop and maintain a schools register. That opened the way for me to write the chapter on education for the comprehensive Living in Singapore guide (published every two years by the American Association): in 2010, in 2012 and for the recently published 2014 edition.

Its focus changes over time, as circumstances here change. The latest edition, for example, has a new section on local school education for expat children, much more information on special needs education and support, and also a section on training and empowerment courses for helpers.





#### What is your best advice to newcomers?

Join an organisation! Don't just rely on your or your working partner's business colleagues, or on the school network, for friends and activities. Have something for yourself, something that excites you and that you could become passionate about.

Connect with like-minded people, ones you can call on when the going gets tough. Practice and, if necessary, relearn the skill of making friends. You may have lost it, especially if you've lived for many years in the same community, surrounded by family and your old school friends.

Finally, become a volunteer - that's the kaya on the toast!


#### The Best of Me

Just settle down, get nice and comfy, dim the lights a bit and let us take you on a ride – that way, when it happens, it happens. I wish everyone could see me grinning right now...

#### Tell us about your character, Charles.

Charles is married to Lisa, the eldest daughter of the Chan family – the focus of this tale we've woven for you this Halloween season. Charles works in the Chan family business, and is trying to provide for Lisa and their future baby that's well on its way at the start of the series. If Charles gets a little cynical at times, it's because he's tired, so cut him some slack please, dear audience; I'm very protective of him.

#### What was the best thing about filming the series in Singapore?

I've been filming here for three years now, so for me it was seeing how – in that short span of time – Singapore has reached the international stage in terms of production values and studio space. To have so much talent – both international and home-grown – come together in one glorious, new soundstage to make something all of us feel is very special is, well, very special indeed. The environment and what we created here in Singapore brought us all together – from a bunch of actors playing a family to actually becoming one. I can't wait for you to see it.

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SMOKESCR

If you're looking for a good read this month, here are our thoughts on a selection of recent releases.

#### Smokescreen Khaled Talib Signal Press | 331 pages

This extraordinary thriller starts in a Cairo souk, where the disguised Ambassador of the US to Singapore and the mysterious old man X hold a covert meeting about a supposed Israeli plot to assassinate the Israeli Prime Minister during his approaching official visit to Singapore.

Who's their inside man? One

Chan Boon Seng, smilingly villainous chief protocol officer of the Singapore Ministry of Foreign Affairs. To take the rap for the assassination, he's singled out Eurasian Jet West, a local lifestyle magazine editor and modest watch-collector who's had the temerity to apply for a licence to publish an independent newspaper. ("Jet knew that women dug his good looks." And his first appearance is in a mauve jacket. Yes, mauve.)

Complete with a Bond-style string of attractive female characters, only a couple of whom manage to survive the ingeniously murderous exploits of Chan's tame killer, the schizophrenic psychopath Fung, the plot zings from Singapore to the Israeli desert and Jerusalem's old Muslim quarter, Buenos Aires, South Australia's Murray River, Chan's Indonesian island fortress Pulau Jakaba, and perhaps a couple more.

It's enjoyable to follow the plucky Jet evading capture in various familiar places, be it in his flashy black Miata, atop a stolen police bike or on foot. He drops into a Tourism Board soirée at Sands Sky Park, (almost) dines at the Alkaff Mansion, finds temporary sanctuary in St Andrew's Cathedral belfry during a blistering action sequence through the colonial district, and visits an underground Chinatown opium den run by a Brummie\* ex-broker-turned-passport-forger.

Jake Needham, author of two novels set in the police and security services of Singapore, says Smokescreen is "nearer to the truth of that closely controlled little country than you might believe", and that it's "a gripping and creepy tale of how governments can rig the way we all see the world".


However true that may be, this could be a cracker of a movie, one to rival Saint Jack. Would permission be granted, this time?

#### The Forbidden Game – Golf and the Chinese Dream Dan Washburn Oneworld | 320 pages

I played golf in China for the first time back in 2001, next to the Ming Tombs on the outskirts of Beijing. As we drove along the laneway to the clubhouse, half a dozen villagers leapt out from



behind trees and approached the car. They were wielding second-hand golf balls that they'd found in the surrounding vegetation and were selling in a clandestine fashion. We bought a dozen or so, and promptly hit them straight back into the out-of-bounds areas, where they would be collected again, and sold again.

At the time, the course we played on was one of only a tiny handful in the country. And it was empty. Yet golf, long considered taboo in China because of its bourgeois connotations, was about to boom. Hundreds of new courses would soon open up across the country, and more and more locals would seize upon the opportunities presented by this growth to seek their fortunes - and not just by selling second-hand balls.

It's this boom - and more than a few subsequent busts - that Dan Washburn documents in his fascinating account. The book revolves around the stories of three vastly different men: Wang, who finds his lychee farm under threat from a massive golf course development; Martin, an American course construction manager who unexpectedly winds up at the forefront of China's golf scene; and Zhou, a peasant whose life follows a bizarre trajectory from security guard to professional golfer.

You don't have to be a fan of golf to enjoy the book, because it's about so much more: rural land rights, corruption, rich versus poor, the environment, and people pursuing dreams. In short, Washburn uses the sport as a window to shed light on all the big issues that China has faced in its meteoric rise.

Australian primary school teacher and Singapore expat, Sarah Mounsey, won a bronze medal for her Paw Prints books in the Moonbeam Children's Book Awards in the category for best picture book series. A member of the ANZA (Australia-New Zealand Association) Writers' Group, she has three boys, whom she thankfully notes were not the inspiration for her very, shall we say, *lively* characters.

#### Why did you self-publish?

Friends from the Singapore Society of Children's Book Writers seriously encouraged me to do so. I'd hoped to be published by a traditional publisher, but publishing houses can get hundreds of submissions every month, and may only publish two picture books in the year.

As printing costs in Singapore are a lot lower than in Australia or England, the risk was lower. It was both exciting and daunting to have complete creative control over my books.

#### What's involved in the process?

A lot of work! You take on so many roles, including editor, marketer, salesperson, small-business administrator and public speaker. For the editing, I'm lucky to have experienced friends who help me.

After registering my business, Brindal Books, I applied for an ISBN number and got quotes from printing companies. I then looked online to find an illustrator, and found the wonderful Jade Fang. We hardly ever meet up while working on a book together, but are constantly emailing each other.


When the artwork is complete, my graphic designer works with me to lay out the text and prepare the cover. For *Paw* 



*Prints and the Itchy Spots*, we tried over 25 different colour combinations for the cover, and three different illustrations! Then final edits are done and the book is sent to print.

#### Who is your distributor?

I work with the brilliant Closetful of Books (closetfulofbooks. com), and my books are available in bookstores throughout Singapore, including Bookaburra, Kinokuniya, Playdate Books, Woods in the Books and Tango Mango. 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# Photography Focus

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



**Verne Maree** chats with Singapore-based author STARR WOOD about his stunning debut novel, *Once Upon a Timepiece*, how he came to be a published writer, and where he got such a fabulous name.

#### What appeals to you about short stories, and why do you think they've become so popular again?

I find the form fascinating. Different from the novel, it's a very natural form of human communication: the story told around a table, or a campfire. It has a sort of brevity and conciseness that reflects how humans communicate anecdotes about their real lives, how they describe their world, and I find that very satisfying.

Also satisfying is the discipline required. The compression that comes with stripping out everything that's not essential makes the short story a very potent way of expressing thoughts and ideas – more powerful, in some ways, than longer forms of fiction. Many writers regard short stories as the most difficult to write.

Various theories have been put forward to explain the resurgent popularity of the short story form. One is the proliferation of writing courses, which encourage people to write short stories as a way of learning the craft. Another is the growing number of competitions, for which the prizes are becoming richer.

What does one call the form of Once Upon a Timepiece – a novel comprising a collection of short stories – and how unusual is it? It's a "short story cycle", a book of short stories that are all linked in some way. While it has been done before, it hasn't been done a lot. Typically, an author might write a set of stories that describe a community, with each story told from the perspective of a different character living in that community. James Joyce's Dubliners is a great example.

My book is unusual in that the people and their stories are all linked by a thing, the watch, rather than by a community; and they're linked chronologically in that the stories, or chapters, follow consecutive months of a particular year. The book is set in the year 2012, it starts in January, and ends in December. The characters in each story are strangers, but they're all linked by an antique gold watch that passes between them.

Collections of linked short stories can be found all through history. Take *The Decameron*, by the 14th-century Italian writer Giovanni Boccaccio, comprising 100 tales told over 10 days by 10 young people who have left their plague-ridden city and retreated to the countryside. Other examples are Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales* and the legendary *One Thousand and One Nights*, set in Persia.

#### Where did you get the idea for Once Upon a Timepiece?

I'd had the ideas for some of the stories brewing in my head for a long time. In fact, I'd written some of the stories long before the book idea came about. So I had a lot of the material already. And then I was struck with the idea of putting them together.

I wanted to express some thoughts about the connectivity between people, the links that join people in ways they don't see. We often walk through our lives without really recognising the links that connect us; indeed, often those links are entirely unseen.

The other big theme in the book is time, how time influences people and how we perceive the impact of time on our lives. Hence, the importance of the watch being the object that passes between the stories. The two ideas – connectivity and time – go together in interesting ways: as time flows, it links both people and disparate events together.

The book has a playful approach. There's a twist in each tale – I hope not a gratuitous twist, but one that brings significance to what's gone before.

#### When did you start writing?

From the age of 15 or 16, my first aspiration was to be a novelist. One of the reasons I went into journalism was because I thought it was the closest thing to being a novelist, but I no longer think that's true.

Journalism is about explaining things as simply as you possibly can, so that people understand them; it's all about "telling" a story in a straightforward way. By contrast, the golden rule of fiction writing is "Show, don't tell." You want readers to figure it out for themselves, which is ultimately a deeper and more meaningful reading experience.

# With a wife and three children, how and when do you write?

It's not easy. The other golden rule of writing is "Writers write", so if you want to be a writer, that's what you have to do, preferably every

day. Most days, I get up at 5am and write from 5am to 7am, before the family is up.

Like many people in Singapore, I travel a lot – about four times a month, so I spend a lot of time in airports and hotel rooms. Once Upon a Timepiece was written in at least 11 or 12 countries. I wrote one story almost entirely while sitting on the floor of Mumbai airport, waiting for a delayed flight.

#### How did you go about getting your first book published?

As any writer will tell you, it's a hard and soul-destroying process, full of rejections, so you have to be patient and persistent. I think the most sensible route is to find a literary agent, as I did. Luck plays a big part, too. Not all that gets published is good, and not all that is good gets published.

#### What are you working on now?

Like most writers, I have at least four or five different books in different stages of progress. For about 14 years, I've been working on a historical thriller set in fifth-century Sri Lanka – breaking all the rules that you should write about what you know!

l've now completed the first draft, but it's been a 17-year passion project, a




labour of love.

Another of my works in progress has a similar concept to Once Upon a Timepiece, in that it revolves around an object that changes hands, linking the people and their stories. It's set in a pub in the UK, and the linking object is a coin: someone uses it to buy a drink, another puts it in the vending machine, another loses it in a bet, and so on. Each of the characters gives you a different perspective on the community, and those different perspectives combine to tell a bigger story.

There's no shortage of ideas, just a shortage of time to realise them!

#### How do you come to have such a wonderful name?

Starr is actually my middle name. The family name, Starr Wood, goes back nine generations to Captain Starr Wood, an English sea captain who is famous for his adventures and skirmishes with the French navy in the English Channel. Starr was the first name of the eldest son in the Wood family for the next seven generations, until my father decided that with me it would become a middle name. So my actual first name is Justin, but I write under Starr because it's a bit more unusual.

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
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


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# WHAT'S NEW



#### **IN HOT WATER**

There's nothing like finding your \$12 tub of raspberries covered in mould the day after you bought them, especially after you took great pains to wash, dry and refrigerate them. The good news is that one tiny tweak to your routine may change this. New research shows you can significantly prolong the life of your berries by rinsing the fruit in hot water rather than cold. In a process called thermotherapy, rinsing berries, grapes and stone fruit in water of temperatures ranging between 45 and a whopping 63 degrees Celsius (or 113 to 145 degrees Fahrenheit) staves off mould for days.

# Electron space, yet full of hawker's centres. So

Singapore is short on space, yet full of hawker's centres. So why not float a few out to sea? That's the idea being proposed by Spark Architects – the masterminds behind a floating hawker centre, called **Solar Orchid**, made up of solar-powered hawker station pods that would pop up in a variety of locations and formats around the city. Lately, I've dominated more than a few water cooler discussions with details about Corner House's **Cocoa Pebbles** dessert – a dish that would look more at home on the rolling lawns of the restaurant's Botanic Gardens location than on a dessert plate. Stop reading and take a look; dewy granite Alpaco chocolate mousse "stones" support meringue mushroom outcrops on a sprinkling of chocolate soil with a hidden spoonful of lemon curd underneath. Gimmicky? Perhaps for some, but I loved it. Maybe it was the surroundings – the historic black-and-white bungalow that was the 16-year home of Les Amis Group's famed Au Jardin (it closed earlier this year) – or maybe it was the fact that the dessert pays homage to the late resident EJH Corner, who held fungi in special regard during his tenure as assistant director of the Botanic Gardens back in the 1930s and 1940s.

This house – and its history – mean that the new occupants have massive shoes to fill. Luckily, executive chef Jason Tan wears a size 12. The Francetrained Singaporean combines skills acquired at the helm of Marina Bay



Sands' Sky on 57 with a pastry chef nabbed when Guy Savoy closed earlier this year, to prepare a cuisine dubbed "gastro-botanica" – a fancy way of saying, "let the plants do the talking".

The emphasis on produce over protein is never more apparent than in the carabinero prawn starter, where, despite the name, tomatoes get top billing. The much bolder oignon doux des Cevenne pulls the onion from the realm of lowly aromatic to the main stage; it's onion done four ways, each as exciting to the palate as to the plate. (This restaurant has perfected the art of food presentation.) Perfectly slowpoached Maine lobster is partnered with riso pasta, rather than a heavier risotto, and complemented with aged Comté, Manjimup black truffle from Australia, delightfully crunchy panseared buckwheat crackles, and a glass of 2011 Pontcin, a crisp Côtes-du-Rhône Viognier.

Four and six courses are \$98 and \$148 respectively; gastronomes should let the kitchen show its chops with the eight-course Discovery Menu (\$248).


I'll be honest: hailing from Southern California, it's been hard for me to fathom paying more than \$10 for "street-style" Mexican; but I've found an exception in the form of Super Loco. Though the new riverside eatery shares some menu items with its über-popular sister restaurant, Lucha Loco, it has plenty of signature specialties in its own right. Count on Lucha favourites like redsnapper-filled taco de pescado (\$11); elotes (\$8) - Mexican grilled corn - and flautas (\$18); and look for newbies like tostadas de atún (\$16) - tuna, chillmayo, mint and lime; spicy enchiladas con pollo (\$22) with paprika cream and roasted salsa; and ceviche de pulpo (\$20), a generous portion of octopus with smoked paprika and squid ink.

Save some room for cinnamon-dusted **Super Churros** (\$12) with chocolate, orange and mescal sauce, and other desserts like **helado de maíz dulce** (\$6), a salted-caramel and sweet-corn ice cream topped with caramel popcorn.

The bar offers a wide selection of tequilas and mezcals, as well as margaritas, wines, beers, sangria and specialty cocktails. Our favourites were the **Passionfruit Smashito** (\$18) – vodka, passionfruit and vanilla nectar – and the refreshing **Paloma** (\$17) – Don Julio Reposado tequila, Aperol, grapefruit and lime juice, and soda.

This taquería's ambience comes from strings of festive lighting and vibrant colours – think hot pink and aquamarine – that capture Mexico City's street-style spirit, and you can't help but want to wander in for some *comida y cocteles*. And, the fact that there's a take-away counter serving late-night tacos, *cervezas* and soft-serve ice cream definitely sweetens the deal. You can bet l'II be back for more.


Free of fuss and hipster pretentions, Der Biergarten has stripped German eating back to basics with simple, traditional food and, of course, quality beer. For maximum atmosphere, sit outside in the laid-back beer garden on busy Prinsep Street, a spot from which to watch the world go by, with some serious comfort food. We'd recommend sharing a couple of dishes for mains: the roast pork knuckle served with beer gravy, creamy mash and sauerkraut (\$24/\$48), alongside the Guinness beef cheek (\$22). The cheesy, more-ish Bavarian pasta spätzle (\$12) and the unusual mushroom fritters (\$10) are both excellent with a draft beer - try Paulaner or San Miguel. To finish, the chef does a reasonable apple strudel (\$13). There's pool and live music upstairs on Monday, Friday and Saturday from 8.30pm, but go knowing you'll gleefully bust any carb-free resolutions.



#### **OCTOBERFEST PLANS?**

This year, five-piece band Anton and the Funny Guys flies in from Germany to play Singapore's Oktoberfest, appearing at Der Biergarten on 16 October. Throughout the month, there's a \$68 set menu and a special Paulaner Oktoberfest draught, brewed and brought in especially from Munich.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS: Lovely warm interior with high industrial ceilings, rustic brickwork and spacious seating.

**THE CHOSEN ONE:** Any of the martinis (\$16, choose from apple, lychee or vodka), as well as the Bubble Gum shooter – a combo of Southern Comfort, crème de banana, grenadine and milk. Bailey's lovers should not leave without trying the Squashed Frog (\$28 for two).

**THE CHEAPSKATE:** \$12 for a full pint from a range of Archipelago draught beers.

**BITE ON THIS:** The thin-crust pizza *rucola e prosciutto* (\$28.80) is the perfect snack to share after a round (or two) of cocktails, while the spaghetti carbonara (\$20.80) is rich and full of flavour.

**WOULD YOU BELIEVE?** Part of the BLVD group, which also runs a number of bars and restaurants in the city area, this casual bar and bistro opens up seating by the roadside, alfresco style, every Friday and Saturday.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS: Modern Chinese, trendy, city crowd.

**THE CHOSEN ONE:** The sweet, strong and terribly more-ish Singapura Sling (\$20) includes spiced, hibiscus-infused London dry gin, cherry Heering, Bénédictine DOM, *goji* and red date syrup, and a mix of orange cream citrate and old time aromatic bitters. It's aged in a barrel for two weeks, then served in a Chinese cup and placed in a little wicker rickshaw lined with monkey nuts. If you have friends in town, this is the place to bring them for a sling; not only is their concoction far better (and cheaper) than the other place that famously sells them, but it's wonderfully quirky – and you still get to throw nuts around.

**THE CHEAPSKATE:** Draught Kirin goes for \$10 per glass; wine starts at \$11.

**BITE ON THIS:** The Atlantic codfish croquettes (\$12), with smoked cream cheese, crispy anchovies and smoked vinegar powder, are a must-try. But be warned, you'll probably fight over these six little bundles of deliciousness, so order two plates.

LAST BUT NOT LEAST: This is a local place with local flavours – you'd be forgiven for walking past as the name is written in Chinese over the door. Ann Siang used to be a nutmeg and clove plantation, so many of the drinks here use these spices as well as others typically found in Southeast Asia. The menu is divided into four eras – Trading Post, Crown Colony, Sovereign State and Metropolis – signifying the changes that the country has been through over the years. The drinks in each of the eras are based on beverages that were popular at the time. Head bartender and resident mixologist, Kai, from Taiwan, came third in the world in the Best Bartender competition, and was judged best in Asia Pacific. The man is a wizard.

I just received two last-minute RSVPs for my dinner party on Friday night. How fast can you deliver to me?	Order before 12 noon, and we will deliver the next day.
I've got \$100 to spend on a steak dinner for two – what should I buy?	Two 300-gram Australian wagyu ribeye steaks with a marbling score of 6/7 will cost you about \$82.80. For the same quality and size, you could expect to pay around \$250 in a restaurant.
Did I say \$100 – I meant \$25! Point me in the right direction.	Go for a big 300-gram Australian grass-fed sirloin steak. That would leave you with \$3.40, which you can use to buy a nice steak butter in flavours like café de Paris, garlic and herb.
I don't want anything with antibiotics or hormones, or anything that was corn-fed. What do you recommend?	Our certified 100-percent organic beef from Australia. The livestock grazes on pasture totally free from synthetic chemicals, herbicides and pesticides. The animals are also free from antibiotics and growth hormones, and the cattle do not feed on corn, grain or animal, agricultural or industrial by-products. They eat only grass and hay – the things, we believe, that cattle are meant to eat. **THE OCCASION:** A great first date spot or something to spice up regular weekend dinners with your spouse. Try to nab one of the two tables on the balcony that overlook the activity on busy Club Street – it's a great people-watching spot. The atmosphere is casual and upbeat, with black-and-white tablecloths and vintage décor complementing the modern European menu. Recently opened, Belle is the prodigy of Beaujolais, a Club Street landmark since 1988.

**THE ONE TO ORDER:** Cote de Boeuf, a one-kilogram, Australian grain-fed, thick beef cut with grade-five marbling. Good for at least two people, it's cooked the French way; grilled for at least 20 minutes and finished in the oven, depending on your "doneness" preference. Served sliced on a board with fries, salad and a choice of sauces, it's a hearty dish, perfect to satisfy any red-meat craving.

**THE OTHERS:** Knowing the steak is coming, start with a simple serving of New Zealand mussels (\$20) cooked in a *pomodoro* sauce. To finish, the white chocolate lava cake (\$12) is an excellent twist on the milk chocolate version. A lighter option is the lychee jelly (\$12) with lemon sorbet. Both are delicious.

**THE OUTLAY:** If you're watching pennies and waistlines, three people could easily share the Cote de Boeuf (\$100), making it good value. The other steak option is the T-bone, which at \$48 is priced for one person; other mains hover around the \$25 mark. There's also Stella draught beer and decent wines at respectable prices. I think we could become regulars.

A three-course lunch for \$21? Yes, this is unbeatable value, available weekdays from 12 noon to 3pm. The menu changes; it currently features a salad, a rack of lamb and white lava cake.

#### **BEDROCK BAR & GRILL**

**THE OCCASION:** Orchard Road is riddled with fast food joints and run-of-the-mill chains, so searching for post-splurge sustenance is often tricky. When you're famished from a day of shopping or looking to reward your man's patience for trawling around the malls with you, Bedrock Bar & Grill is a great option.

**THE ONE TO ORDER:** If you're hunting as a pack, I recommend you tuck into the Tomahawk Steak, an on-the-bone chunk of prime ribeye weighing in from a hefty 1.6kg to 2.5kg (and priced at \$96 per 400g). This grain-fed F1 wagyu from Australia is Bedrock's pride and glory. If you like your meat a little leaner, try the USDA prime tenderloin (\$89 for 240g), which is packed with flavour.

**THE OTHERS:** Vegans will feel surprisingly at home here, with the grilled, meaty mushroom "Steak" Diane and truffle fries (\$32) a popular choice.



For dessert, the apple crumble for two (\$25) is an all-time favourite, thanks to its oven-baked apples, walnut streusel and over-sized scoop of vanilla ice cream; it's so good you'll find it difficult to put the spoon down.

**THE OUTLAY:** If your wallet's already taken a knock from the shops, the prices here are bound to add insult to injury; but servings are hefty, so you could skip appetisers. Groups would do well to home in on the "For the Table" options: the rack of lamb (\$129) and twice-cooked beef ribs (\$98) will feed three or four people. And make your pennies go further during the generous happy hour stretch from Monday to Saturday – between 3pm and 9pm, you can enjoy one-for-one on selected beers, house wines and spirits.

**THE OCCASION:** An early dinner with the kids. The service is speedy, and the booths intimate, ensuring a relaxing yet not too drawn-out meal (little darlings won't tolerate highchairs for too long, of course) at this cosy American-style steakhouse.

THE ONE TO ORDER: My husband is a man who likes a good steak (preferably from Morton's) so it was questionable how this relatively cheap steak meal (with steamed veggies and a choice of mash, jacket or fries) would go down. The eight-ounce USDA tenderfoot filet mignon (\$54; one ounce of beef is around 30 grams) – all natural, air-flown, "dry aged to perfection" steak was, he says, faultless, and a completely clean plate was a testament to that. And, it was excellent value for money – about a quarter of the price of his favourite place.

**THE OTHERS:** Who can resist a colossal battered and fried onion, shaped like a desert flower? Not us. This is an American favourite, and it was done well here with a lovely, tangy Wild West dip. The Bourbon Street pecan pie was average, but the Florida key lime pie really hit the spot, despite the meringue having been replaced by fresh cream. Being a big fish-eater, I went for the pan-fried cod seabass with mango salsa, which was flaky, flavourful and also cooked to perfection.

**THE OUTLAY:** Prices here are pretty reasonable, considering the portion sizes. You'll need a big appetite if you're going to take a starter (ranging from \$8.50 to \$23) as well as a main (steaks from \$34 to \$66). The set lunch is a great deal – for around \$25 you get a starter, main, side order and dessert with a soft drink – though you'll need to plan for a siesta after this one!

**THE OCCASION:** A carnivore's birthday or an anniversary splurge, but there's a good choice of other modern Aussie fare, too, including vegetarian dishes. Or pop in for pre- or post-prandial drinks and perhaps tapas in the eyrie-like Sky Bar, one level up and with a stunning vista. (No, in fact, better book ahead.) High ceiling-to-floor windows give spectacular views from the 55th storey of ION Orchard, so best book a window table.

**THE ONE TO ORDER:** Served table-side, the wagyu tri-tip, from Mayura Station on the Limestone Coast of South Australia, is – like all the beef on the menu – free-range farmed. We're assured that the wagyu is raised very similarly to how it's done in Japan. Today's cut is terrifically tasty and winsomely tender, thanks to an immaculate pedigree and a marble score of 9+. It's served with baby zucchini, caramelised onion, parmesan polenta, cherry tomato and red wine jus. It's fun experimenting with the selection of mustards provided, too. (What? No Colman's Hot English?)

**THE OTHERS:** Signature appetiser sashimi of kingfish with marinated ginger and shallots and goat's milk feta is a winner, or try the elegant tea-smoked quail with almond cream, prunes, grilled shallot and sorrel. Lovers of fillet will enjoy the 200g Maori Lakes NZ 150-day grain-fed fillet, topped with béarnaise sauce and served with giant and tender spears of grilled green asparagus.

**THE OUTLAY:** Appetisers are in the range \$31 to \$42, and mains start from about \$50. The wagyu cut of the day is "market priced", and it's \$75 for the fillet. With views like this, though, you're getting dinner *and* a show.

**THE OCCASION:** A brief respite from a quick shopping trip and the perfect spot for a lunchtime girlie catch up. Bag a booth by the window for good views of Emerald Hill and Orchard Road.

**THE ONE TO ORDER:** The ribeye (\$37.90). This comes with a decent amount of marbling through its eight ounces. It's seasoned with Outback's secret blend of 17 different seasonings. Whatever's in it, it tastes good, and if you like it, you can buy it. The ribeye, as with all of Outback's steaks bar the striploin (which is from the US), is from Australia, and is grain-fed, dry-aged Angus beef.

**THE OTHERS:** Although the flavours of our shared starter of crab cakes (\$15.90) were good, the two patties came with a little too much grease and not enough crunch on the outside. The spicy remoulade, however, was delicious. The other main of sirloin and grilled shrimp (\$34.90) came with juicy corn on the cob and a pot of coleslaw, which was freshly made – a rarity here. Dessert, the "chocolate thunder from Down Under" (\$14.90), was an enormous, warm chocolate brownie with vanilla ice cream, cream and chocolate sauce. This was the only time conversation halted completely.

**THE OUTLAY:** Prices range from \$27.90 for the six-ounce sirloin to \$39.90 for the steak and ribs combo. The restaurant also offers lunch specials from Monday to Friday, starting at \$12.90 for a grilled pork chop with Aussie fries (more thickly cut than French), the soup of the day and a glass of soda.

**THE OCCASION:** A birthday treat for the steak-lover in your life who also has an affinity for Japanese fare. If they've never tried Japanese steak, even better, as the first bite of steak of this calibre is nothing short of a paradigm-shifting meat-eating experience. Private tables are available, but the best place to chat up the chefs about the meal you're about to embark on is at the U-shaped counter around the open kitchen.

**THE ONE TO ORDER:** The Japanese steaks – any of them. These steaks contain more fat than Aussie and American steaks – *in a good way*; rather than being marbled in thick bands, the fat is dotted throughout, buckshot style. The tiny pockets melt into the meat when cooked, producing some of the best bites of steak that I've ever had the pleasure of eating. The grade A3 sirloin is fantastic, but consider upgrading to lwate prefecture A5 ribeye if you have the means. Or go for the *omakase* tasting platter for a side-by-side taste test of Japanese, Aussie and US steaks. Each plate comes with roasted ginger soy sauce, a *sudachi* wedge, a mound of sea salt and a quarter thimble of *yuzu kosho*, a powerfully spicy citrus sauce, allowing you to dabble in different flavour contrasts as the meal progresses.

**THE OTHERS:** Since the meat is so rich, go light around the edges. Start with the house sea bream speciality, an unbelievable combination of raw fish and black truffle, with *konbu* and chives added in for good measure. The *momotaro* salad is a sliced Japanese tomato with spicy *mizuna* (Japan's version of arugula) and ginger *ponzu* 

- so simple, yet so divine (try finding tomatoes like this at your local grocer). The red bean *obanyaki* (lemony pancakes with braised red beans and pink *sakura* floss) is an interesting end to the meal, though I'd be just as happy with one scoop of the artisanal *yuzu* ice cream next time.

THE OUTLAY: Japanese steak of this quality doesn't come cheap; expect to pay between \$90 and \$150 for 150 grams for the meat alone. The prices of sides and starters run the gamut – the heavenly sea bream is \$38, while a bowl of homemade udon is a humble \$9. Veggie sides, like eggplant glazed in honey miso and sake, lime and butter-braised mushrooms, cost between \$10 and \$15.

**THE OCCASION:** A quick bite before the cinema or a fuss-free shopping break with the kids. This conveniently located and fun eatery is a no-frills dining experience that is ideal if you just want good quality food, quickly and affordably.

**THE ONE TO ORDER:** The highly flavoured wagyu flank (200 grams, \$32.90) from Australia is a delicious cut from the abdominal muscles of the cow. It tends to be bright red in colour as it comes from a well-exercised part of the animal, and is best sliced against the grain for tenderness. Being a huge meat-lover, I ordered this steak rare and it was melt-in-the-mouth, accompanied perfectly by the pepper sauce.

**THE OTHERS:** The Hippo 5th Avenue burger (\$17.90) combines a thick juicy beef patty with onions, salad and crispy strips of bacon. If you still have room for dessert, the French toast Nutella (\$7.50) is something special, a perfect sweet treat for the kids!

**THE OUTLAY:** For the quality of the steaks, this is a well-priced restaurant. Expect to pay anywhere from \$30 to \$40 for your steak, which includes two sides and a sauce.

# CRISPY CORNFLAKE-BAKED FISH Serves 3



#### Shar Kay, Singaporean

"I'm married to an American, and we have two lovely young daughters who are my inspiration for adopting a healthier cooking style without compromising on taste and texture. I write all about my cooking adventures on my blog, www.delishar.com."



#### Ingredients:

- 2 fillets of halibut, about 600g cut into 2.5 inch pieces
- 1 egg
- 3 tbsp milk
- 1/4 cup all purpose flour
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp garlic salt
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp onion powder
- 1/2 tsp dried parsley flakes
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 tbsp shredded parmesan cheese
- 21/2 cups cornflakes, crushed in a Ziploc bag
- Oil or cooking spray

#### Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 220 degrees Celsius.
- 2. On a plate, mix salt and pepper, garlic salt, onion powder and parsley into the flour.
- Beat the egg and milk together in a bowl.
- 3. Place the crushed cornflakes and cheese on another plate and mix well.
- 4. First coat fish with flour mixture, then dip in egg mixture, then coat in cornflake mixture.
- 5. Place fish pieces on an oiled baking pan a few centimetres apart.
- 6. Bake on the lower rack for 12 to 15 minutes until the fish flakes easily. Serve alongside crispy green salad.



# LEMON DRIZZLE CAKE Serves 8





#### Mary Lobb, British

"Lemon drizzle cake is a tea-time classic that's super-simple to make, even at short notice. It also travels well, so it's great for picnics. The topping is very tangy and has a satisfying crunch, but you can also experiment with frosting and glaze toppings."



#### Ingredients: Cake:

- 100g softened butter
- 150g self-raising flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 150g golden caster sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 6 tbsp milk
- finely grated rind of a large, unwaxed lemon

#### Icing:

- juice of a large lemon (use an extra lemon if you like the topping really zingy)
- 100g golden caster sugar

#### Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees Celsius / gas mark 4. Line a tin (approx. 20cm x 20cm) with baking parchment, or use a loaf tin.
- 2. Tip all the cake ingredients into large mixing bowl and beat for two to three minutes until mixture drops easily off a spoon. Spoon the mixture into the tin and flatten it with the back of a spoon.
- 3. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes until it's golden and a toothpick comes out clean.
- Beat together icing ingredients and pour over the cake while still hot.
- 5. For squares, cool in tin before cutting; othewise, allow to cool and turn out as a loaf.

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A Holiday with

Michaela at Angkor Wat

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id you know that tourists started trickling to the Angkor temples and ruins around Siem Reap as early as 1907? By the mid-1920s there was a proposal to construct five hotels throughout French Indochina to host what was turning into a flood of visitors. They even continued to come during the Great Depression, with 1934 alone recording 2,817 tourists, mostly from America but also Europe.

Aside from the temples, hunting was a big attraction; right up until the 1950s, Cambodian "game" included wild buffalo, bears, elephants, tigers and panthers. Thank goodness it's all about photography safaris today – I doubt if there'd be many of the big game animals left to hunt, even if someone wanted to.

For me, the appeal of Siem Reap is not just the nearby temples, but also the fact that everything is in one area, mostly within walking or *tuk tuk* distance. The markets are cheap and the haggling











isn't aggressive. The beer and food is (mostly) cheap. And the place has got a little buzz all of its own. So when my eldest daughter and I decided to have a weekend away together, I thought Siem Reap would be the perfect place: a bit of culture, a bit of history (which she studied at school), and some shopping and eating!

On previous trips, I had stayed in four-star and no-star (\$15 a night) accommodation respectively; both were great. This time I opted for something different: Raffles Grand Hotel d'Angkor. The hotel had recently sent some lovely images through to *Expat Living*, and one of our editors, Katie, stayed there on a previous trip, so I thought as a treat it would be nice to stay somewhere special. The original hotel opened in Siem Reap in the early 1930s, and my daughter and I were both excited about staying in a place so full of history.

On arrival, the hotel – which is a creamy yellow colour – didn't seem as "manicured" as the Raffles in Singapore. Yet it's still grand. Based on the "palace" hotels of Europe of that period, with its raised portico, shutters and balconies, it's also linked by gardens to the current royal residence of Siem Reap. The hotel is superbly maintained inside and has a real "old world" feel. We were absolutely wowed when we were upgraded to one of the two suites; Hilary Clinton had stayed in it recently while in Cambodia on a diplomatic visit. How's that for "historic"?











The suite was so big that my daughter and I decided to sleep in the same room as the bedrooms were so far apart – there was a huge living-cum-dining room in between the rooms. The beds were very firm, though, so I'm not sure how "Hils" would have got on. There's also a large, deep veranda, so it does feel like you're staying in a separate villa. The hotel's huge swimming pool is only a couple of hundred metres away, set behind frangipanis and other plants.

Raffles is only eight kilometres from Angkor Wat, and it's easy to get there by *tuk tuk* or car – or bicycle, if you're really keen. We passed quite a few tourists on bikes in the dark at 5am – we weren't sure if they were brave or stupid. Regardless of whether you want to cycle or walk, I wouldn't recommend going on a long visit to the temples in July; the heat was pretty stifling, even when we were on the way back from our first tour at 7.15am. We were very grateful for the nice cold towels the driver provided us with at regular intervals (e.g., as we came through the airport, as we entered the hotel, and every time we got back in to the car after sight-seeing – brilliant!).

After watching the sunrise at Angkor Wat, we spent about a further hour there, mainly looking at the stories carved into the stone walls. While it was interesting enough for my teenager, the need for breakfast did get in the way of further exploration. And although the tour guides are always good, ours was a little too chatty for 5am. We needed time to wake up!







It was so good to be able to come back to the luxury of Raffles and a really wonderful breakfast (Champagne included in this) before we set off on our next adventure. This time it was to the Bayon and Ta Prohm ("the Tomb Raider temple"); I can't decide which is my favourite – the stone faces at Bayon are so beautiful, but the way nature has worked its way through the ruins at Ta Prohm and the colour of that temple's stones really fascinate me.

Later we had quite a long session at the museum; it's worth getting the individual headphone sets so you can go at your own pace. There are also ceramic, silk and silver shops that are worth popping into; I spent a fortune on a couple of pieces and I'm not sure if I paid too much or not! The markets are definitely value for money – lots of silver jewellery, cool baggy "elephant" pants that are the uniform of Cambodian tourists, and nice crockery and artefacts. Always shop at night – it's much cooler. There are plenty of massage places and we had a fabulous foot massage, fish spa and then pedicure, all for about \$10. The quality of the food varies; on Pub Street we had a great meal the first night and an awful one the next. My advice is wait until you see where others are eating – if it's empty, avoid it. The food at the hotel was excellent and I wish we had had dinner there on the second night; lunch on the first day was excellent and very reasonably priced.

A *tuk tuk* from Raffles to the middle of town is around three to five dollars; you can ask them to wait for you or SMS them when you're ready, but there are always plenty around. I always pay them more – in my way, that's my "charity". And I always try to buy a book or two from the children selling them on the streets. *First They Killed My Father* is written by a lady who is now a lawyer living in the US. She was seven, I think, when the Khmer Rouge marched her and her family out of Phnom Penh, and the book is all about those years



in the Killing Fields. This time, I bought the follow-up, *The Lucky Child*, which surrounds her reunion years later with the few members of her family that had survived. It's fascinating and kind of scary that things like this are still going on in the world. You'd think we would have learnt by now!

This part of the world witnessed all kinds of things over the last century: with the Japanese military presence in the late 1930s and early 1940s, tourism went on hold; but there was a recovery, and the years between 1955 to 1965 witnessed huge growth and modernisation - Jacqueline Kennedy and Princess Margaret were amongst the visitors then. The 1970s and 1980s saw prospects dive again, but since the mid-1990s the region and the hotel - have been on the up. Raffles International Ltd took over the property in 1996, and Raffles Grand Hotel d'Angkor opened at the end of 1997 with 131 rooms, about twice the original number.

The hotel has seen lots of interesting guests in its history – will it end up seeing you, too? This is a great place for a break – a short break, that is: two or three nights will do. And if you enjoy it, you can always go back again – like me. **2**


#### ALL-ROUND – South Africa

From the Wall to the Warriors, China has something to offer every visitor. Here's our guide to making the most of your time in the Middle Kingdom.

#### SEE

China's capital is a sprawling mega-city of 21 million people and five-and-a-half million cars (not all on the road at the same time, thanks to the "odds and evens" number-plate system). But it's a city of contrasts: away from the wide boulevards lined with grand, statement buildings, which feel more akin to a European capital, are the narrow, grey **hutongs**, or traditional neighbourhoods.

Many of these historic warrens are within walking distance of two of Beijing's best-known sights: the Forbidden City and Tiananmen Square. The central area that includes these landmarks is one of just a handful that tourists should concentrate on. Others, a taxi ride away, include the shopping and night-life enclave of **Sanlitun**, the art galleries of quirky **798** district, and the renowned **Summer Palace**.

Though many hutongs were demolished a decade ago in the rush to modernisation, the 25 that remain standing are protected. One of these is **Wudaoying**, close to the Forbidden City and home to the **Drum Tower**, once the city's time-keeper. While many residents have sold and moved out to high-rise developments, there's a certain feel to the hutongs that no apartment complex can replicate.

The narrow lanes, high walls and large, forbidding wooden doors conceal quaint courtyards shared by residents, often extended family. Also shared, by tourists and residents alike, are the public toilets. (Warning: the low partitions do not allow much privacy.)

An intriguing custom to follow when passing through the doorway of a home or temple is to avoid standing or stepping on the wooden threshold, known as "the edge of difficulty". It's meant to keep out the evil spirits, who have no knees and cannot jump.

Kids will be fascinated to meet some of the personalities who call the hutongs home, but a guide is essential for translation. Retired cricket-trainer (the insect, not the bat-and-ball sport), 64-year-old Mr Liu, welcomes people into his home for insights into the thousandyear-old tradition of cricket-fighting. He proudly shows off the champion status of his crickets, and the accoutrements required for breeding them. There's even a tiny wedding chamber and, of course, coffins. Hugely popular, the fights are legal, though gambling on them is illegal.

Eating dumplings for lunch and riding a rickshaw through the narrow alleys is a fun way to take in the pace of hutong daily life. Stunning **Lama Temple**, **Houhai Lake** and **Beihai Park** are all easily accessible from Wudaoying, and a boat ride across the lakes of Houhai or Beihai at sunset is highly recommended.

In a half day it's possible to take in **Tiananmen Square** after a selfguided visit to the enormous 73-hectare **Forbidden City** (40 RMB, S\$8). Get kitted out with an audio guide (an additional 40 RMB), which kids above TIP: Seeing any city with a local resident as guide can make for a more meaningful – and less stressful: - experience. The ultra-professional team at Bespoke Beijing offers set and customised itineraries around Beijing with knowledgeable and caring guides who speak excellent English. (Frank and Michael are highly recommended.) (Frank and Michael are highly recommended.) While the tours are not cheap, they do maximise the Beijing experience. Bespoke-beijing.com

eight years will enjoy, and be prepared for walking, walking and more walking. The "city" itself is 750 meters from east to west, and 960 meters from north to south. There are reportedly 9,999 rooms, the moat is 52 metres wide and there are 308 copper pots that were used to hold water for fire-fighting.

Once you've finished in the Forbidden City, if it's a clear day and you've still got some stamina, walk directly across the road from the northern exit to the lookout in **Jingshan Park**. The view over this part of Beijing is stunning and you will understand, seeing the size of the Forbidden City, why your feet are throbbing.

It's probably sensible to visit Tiananmen Square before all of this (it's directly across from the southern entry point), but if you're happy to retrace your steps, or hail a taxi, it's interesting to see the square at sunset, when the Chinese flag is lowered by soldiers in a patriotic ceremony.

shower, bathroom mirror with builtin television, and a toilet that eerily seems to second guess every (ahem) movement. Guests on Club Floors are

entitled to 24-hour access to the 18thfloor Club Lounge with complimentary cocktails and canapés every evening. Breakfast is served there daily, too.

**RESTAURANTS:** As the first Beijing restaurant with an open kitchen, Kerry's Kitchen is renowned for its huge buffet breakfasts, easy lunches and a dinner selection of international favourites. To satisfy a craving for the legendary Beijing dish, Peking duck, visit The Horizon where Chef Yuan Chao Ying grills the finest farmed ducks over jujube wood for a crispy, melt-in-the-mouth experience. For night owls, Centro is a popular bar with live music.

**RECREATION** Within the hotel, Kerry Sports is a state-of-the-art gym with fitness classes and a 35-metre swimming pool. The best bit, as far as kids are concerned, is the Adventure Zone. Children from six months to 12 years will burn off energy on the challenging slides, soft play equipment and high-quality toys.

**RATING** This is a brilliant hotel with something for every member of the family, and unbeatable value for a five-star property. Within easy reach of the hotel are the Silk and Sanlitun markets and the embassy district. The Forbidden City is about a 15-minute taxi ride. From \$\$300 per night.

Aman Summer Palace is a tranquil shelter from the bustle of Beijing, though just one wall away from one of the city's biggest attractions.

**LOCATION:** It is located in northeast Beijing – about 40 minutes by car from the city centre – in a walled compound to the east of the famous Summer Palace. A wall separates the hotel from the former imperial living quarters inside the palace.

**LOOK:** Think weeping willows, bamboo-lined stone paths, painted corridors and Chinese courtyards. The hotel blends seamlessly with the imperial architecture of the Summer Palace – as it should: many of the buildings are over 100 years old. There are no lifts, no signs of any kind, no grand ballrooms and no tour groups. It's a quiet, regal place – a place to reflect after days spent battling legions of tourists at the Forbidden City and Tiananmen Square, a place where you can expect to dine, swim and stroll in peace.

**LUXURY:** Rooms boast carved Chinese walls, gabled ceilings, fine Chinese porcelain and Bose speakers from which emanate the soft sounds of mandolin strings. Chinese tea, baked goods and complimentary mini-bar drinks are replenished daily. There are only 50 rooms and suites, though guests can still enjoy private Pilates



TIP: Hotel guests get private access to the Summer Palace through a secret door that links the two properties. Not only do you avoid entrance fees and queues, but you can go before or after official opening times to escape the crowds.

classes (with or without Reformer machines), a grand spa experience, a luxury gym workout and a nightly film in the hotel cinema. Three on-site restaurants offer traditional Chinese (including an absolutely exquisite platter of Peking duck), French and *kaiseki*-style Japanese fare. Breakfasts are, of course, made to order.

**LASTING IMPRESSIONS:** A few things not to miss at Aman Summer Palace: afternoon tea on the terrace of the lotus pond, learning Chinese calligraphy in the Cultural Pavilion, participating in the daily tea ceremony, and enjoying a morning picnic of *viennoiseries* and smoked salmon on the palace grounds before the gates open to the general public. amanresorts.com





#### WHAT IS THE SUMMER PALACE?

Building of the former summer home of the Chinese imperial family was started in 1153 and not completed until the mid-1700s. It was abandoned in the 1920s and 30s after the fall of the last emperor, and renovated from head to toe before the 2008 Beijing Summer Olympics. The site – which is dominated by the manmade Kunming Lake – features gardens, former imperial living quarters and a temple, and is now one of Beijing's main tourist draws.

# THE GREAT V

It's a wall steeped in legend, myths and, well... shockingly steep inclines. It's also one of the biggest tourist attractions in the world.

#### SEE

Popular sections of the Great Wall include:

- Badaling the most visited section of the Wall. Just 80 kilometres away, it's the closest to Beijing, completely renovated (for better or worse) and outfitted with wide, well-paved granite paths and handrails, making it easier to climb than most sections. It's also the spot of choice for big tour operators (which are known to make frequent pit-stops at souvenir factories along the way).
- Mutianyu Less crowded than Badaling, though still popular with independent travellers and smaller tour companies. Cable cars shuttle tourists from the base to the top of the mountain for spectacular views. To get down, you can hike, jump back on the cable cars or opt for a wind-inyour-hair toboggan ride, which will ruin forever the thrill of the luge on Sentosa.

- Simatai The two-hour-plus drive from Beijing deters most tourists, as do the plunging cliffs, jagged ridges and super-steep watch towers. The charm of this section of the wall is that it's largely un-renovated, though major parts of this section are now closed exactly for this reason.
- Jinshanling Starting point for a steep 7km hike to Simatai that takes from three to four hours for the reasonably fit.
- Huanghuacheng and Jiankou These sections are strictly for those with hiking boots and a healthy relationship with heights; stretches are steeper and bricks are looser along these unrestored parts of the wall.
- Other parts a group called Beijing Hikers (beijinghikers.com) organises tours to more remote parts of the wall. This is a decent option for strong-backed tourists who loathe weak-backed ones.



#### STAY

**HOW LONG?** If you have limited time, then a day trip is your only option. However, while you'll check the box and get plenty of photos to splash across social media on a one-day visit, we recommend

staying overnight at the Wall, if possible. This allows you to go to different parts of the structure at different times of the day to fully experience this great historic landmark.

#### WHERE?

House: Opened in 2006, The School House is a sustainable tourism enterprise that provides employment for village residents, enabling them to stay put, rather than head to Beijing to find work. Longterm American expat Jim Spears and his enthusiastic business partners have transformed a former school (it closed when the local population shrank) into a glass-blowing enterprise and a restaurant that champions locally produced food. In March this year, Michelle Obama and her daughter lunched here and visited the Wall, amidst tight security.

They've also restored eight disused village houses into comfortable visitor accommodation that retains traditional features. Best explored on foot, the area offers numerous walks around Mutianyu, taking in the orchards and a new visitor centre. It also produces artisanal, natural and sustainable products.

There's a steep track to a wild section of the Wall, which abuts the more touristy part. Here, a solitary experience on a crumbling, unrestored wall awaits. Depending on the time of year, you'll experience spring blossoms, blazing autumn leaves or winter snow. Stay for the quiet that descends when the tour groups leave in the afternoon; by 8pm there's not a sound to be heard nor a person to be seen on the streets of the village, in stunning contrast to Beijing.

**Grandma's House** is a twobedroom house with kitchen, laundry, two bathrooms and large enclosed garden, perfect for a family. Other houses are larger, and feature gorgeous interiors and views of the Great Wall. Houses start from 2,800 RMB per night. **theschoolhouseatmutianyu.com**  Hotel: **The Brickyard** is a 25-room lodge and spa close to Mutianyu. Rooms have a modern rustic feel and feature a glass wall and outdoor terrace with spectacular views of the Great Wall. There is an onsite restaurant that offers free breakfast and coffee, tea and homemade cookies throughout the day. Transportation is available (though not at all times of the day) to and from Mutianyu, which is about ten minutes

away. brickyardatmutianyu.com

Farmhouse: William Lindesay is a British Great Wall researcher who has been walking and writing about the Wall for decades. His company, Wild Wall, organises excursions to unofficial and remote sections of the wall through weekend trips (including guided hikes with two nights' accommodation in a farmhouse and meals) to longer camping-style, point-to-point "extreme" hiking adventures. wildwall.com

**GETTING THERE:** Popular options include taking a public bus, booking a tour, dishing out a few more dollars for a private guide or seeking something offbeat, like travelling via chauffeured sidecar. We've heard rave reviews about Beijing Sideways; you'll just want to make sure the air quality is good enough for your nasal passages to travel comfortably without a windshield. **beijingsideways.com**  TIP: Violet and Kong also provide day tours (including the Forbidden City, Tiananmen Square, Jingshan Park, the Summer Palace and other famous sites), offer transportation to and from airports and train stations, and can book train tickets to Xi'an and other cities before you arrive in Beijing, Full-day tour rates start at 1,100 RMB. If you decide to stay at the Wall for a few nights, round-trip transportation can be booked through companies like **Violet and Kong**, a husband-and-wife team of licensed tour guides with great English skills and a knack for promptly replying to emails. Round-trip transport from Beijing to Mutianyu starts at 800 RMB.

#### THE MYTH THAT WON'T QUIT

#### The Great Wall is the only manmade structure that can be seen from space. FALSE!

Debunked time and time again, this myth is so ingrained in popular culture that astronauts, including Neil Armstrong, have reported being asked this question ad nauseum. Recently, high-tech equipment has been able to detect the wall – and other objects – from low orbit, but the fact remains that the human eye cannot detect the Great Wall from space.







GETTING THERE: Xi'an is over 1,000 kilometres from Beijing; a high-speed train service that opened in December 2012 can get you there in 5.5 hours. Highspeed trains depart from both cities ten times a day; those who prefer to take their time can choose an overnight sleeper trains. Direct flights are around two hours.

**STAY:** We recommend a two-night stay (which allows for visiting the Terracotta Warriors and a full day

in Xi'an) at the Crown Plaza Xi'an, an upscale, relatively new hotel with reasonable rates, good service and very comfortable rooms. It's located in Xi'an's tallest building, the Shaanxi Xinxi Tower, not far from the CBD and city walls, making it a popular choice with business and leisure travellers alike.

SEE: The Terracotta Warriors are, of course, the main draw to this city of eight million people. The excavation sites are located east of Xi'an and can be viewed in a few hours, leaving time to tour the Tomb of Emperor Jingdi, snake through the narrow alleys and food stalls of the

The terracotta soldiers protect the tomb of Qin Shi Huang, which is said to be a palatial underground cavern filled with jewels, rivers of mercury (ground tests in the area show mercury levels 100 times higher than normal) and Indiana Jones-style booby traps. For a number of reasons, the tomb has yet to be excavated. For now, you'll have to settle for a photo of the grassy mound that covers it, located 2km from the terracotta soldiers' excavation site.

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#### SEE

Many families travelling with children bypass Shanghai in favour of Beijing, because it has fewer landmark tourist sights. But this cosmopolitan city of 23 million has much to entertain young minds. Given that Singapore already offers children great waterparks and zoos, there's not much point spending time at similar attractions when there are some of the world's tallest buildings and unique neighbourhoods to explore.

Though the landmark 468-metre Oriental Pearl Tower in Pudong is no longer the city's tallest building (it was overtaken by the Shanghai World Financial Centre in 2008), it does house the impressive Shanghai History Museum. Through models, dioramas and special effects, it lays out the story of the city from its beginnings as a village 1,000 years ago to global prominence in the 1930s, along with its present-day obsession with skyscrapers.

Also in Pudong is the semi-completed **Shanghai Tower**; at 632 metres, or 121 storeys, it will become the world's secondtallest building when it is completed next year. Across the **Huangpu River** (which is crisscrossed by 10 tunnels and 10 bridges) is the 1.5km riverfront promenade known as the **Bund**. Whether you walk, drive or take a boat cruise to see its 25 century-old buildings, it's handy to have a guide or a brochure with information about each building.

The labyrinthine **Yu Garden** is one of the city's biggest attractions. Separated into small courtyards by dragon-shaped walls, the gardens were built in 1559 in traditional style and overflow with wooden pavilions, koi ponds, pagodas, stunning trees and a 12-metre-high rockery.

In complete contrast are the European **concessions**, designated areas of the city that were granted to foreign countries in the 1800s. Shanghai operated as a treaty port, which meant that foreign countries had their own jurisdictions; the respective neighbourhoods subsequently developed strong cultural identities. Taking a self-guided walking tour around the tree-lined back streets feels, at times, like strolling through a European city.

Many people head for **Xintiandi**, where upmarket boutiques and restaurants have gentrified the traditional 19thcentury *shikumen* houses. (*Shikumen* is a traditional Shanghainese architectural style marked by grey- and red-brick walls and arches.) Ironically, this lavish commercial area was also the location of the First Congress of the Chinese Communist Party.

In Shanghai's rush to modernity, traditional handicrafts have thankfully not been forsaken. At the **Museum of Arts and Crafts**, visitors can watch dozens of artisans at work, including jade- and wood-carvers, paper-cutters, embroiderers, jewellers and painters. Housed in a stately 100-year-old French mansion with sweeping staircases, it's a place to find authentic souvenirs; the artisans will intrigue curious children, too.

Amongst the myriad shopping and tailoring options, it's hard to beat the AP Markets in the basement of the Shanghai Science and. Technology Museum.

Directly accessible by the Metro station named after the museum, the markets are the place to bargain hard for knockoff goods.

TIP: Visit the warren of laneways known as Tian Xi Fang, a bohemian mix of studios, cafes and quirky shops all hemmed inside narrow alleys teeming with atmosphere. Whether you're shopping or not, it's a unique neighbourhood to get lost in.





Some would argue it's better to look at the Bund, rather than the opposite outlook of Pudong's futuristic buildings. The 950room Shangri-La was Pudong's first luxury hotel and sits comfortably in Shanghai's top 10 hotels according to TripAdvisor.

**R00M** Request a river-view room for a priceless outlook of The Bund; it's stunning enough by day, but really comes into its own when lit up at night. The rooms are elegant with subtle Oriental touches in the wallpaper and art, complemented by crystal chandeliers and marble bathrooms. Horizon Club guests enjoy L'Occitane toiletries in their rooms, plus 24-hour access and complimentary services at the Horizon Club Lounge on the 32nd floor.

**RESTAURANTS** There are 11 restaurants and bars in the Pudong Shangri-La, including Japanese and Chinese eateries, a wine bistro and Jade on 36, the signature restaurant and bar. Yi Café features 10 lively show kitchens and a cosmopolitan food selection for the huge buffet breakfast (there's even a map, it's so big) – don't miss it.

**RECREATION** Alongside the awardwinning spa, CHI, there are two swimming pools, two health clubs and an outdoor floodlit tennis court.

**RATING** The promise of high tea in the Lobby Lounge, an elegant Michelinstar dining experience, or a long hot bath, makes the Shangri-La a welcome respite from the frenetic pace of a city that doesn't sleep.

#### HANGZHOU

It's the home of China's famed West Lake, a domestic tourist magnet and an area of natural beauty (when the smog cooperates, of course). Of China's 72 lakes, this is the most popular. Catch misty scenes of tai chi being performed on the water's edge at sunrise, drink a cup of longjing tea made with leaves plucked in nearby plantations, tour the many temples and monasteries that dot the area, and book a seat at Impression West Lake, a spectacular outdoor performance directed by Zhang Yimou, the mastermind behind the 2008 Beijing Summer Olympics opening and closing ceremonies. Stay in the remains of a 300-year-old tea village next to one of area's most sacred temples, Longyin Si, by booking a stay at Amanfayun. amanresorts.com

#### WATER VILLAGES OF THE YANGTZE **RIVER DELTA**

On the edge of Shanghai's urban sprawl, a dozen or so ancient villages line the small lakes and waterways of the Yangtze River delta. Zhujiajiao is pleasant enough to warrant a half-day trip, though be aware that anything authentic has long disappeared, and most of the quaint town shops now sell food and souvenirs. Still, the old Ming- and Qing-dynasty architecture, including that of bridges across the narrow canals, is atmospheric, and many visitors take a leisurely boat ride. This is a domestic tourism magnet, so it's best to visit late in the afternoon on a weekday. Take the hour-long bus ride from People's Square in central Shanghai, or arrange a car and driver.

#### SUZHOU

Trace the steps of artists, scholars and Chinese high society through gardens, canals and arched bridges in this picturesque town. Express trains can get you from Shanghai to Suzhou in less than 30 minutes. Highlights include the West Garden Temple, the Taoist Temple of Mystery, and an hour-long boat ride around the outer canal every evening starting from the Renmin Bridge.

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Never one to spend an excessive, amount of time in shops, SHAMUS SILLAR instead gets acquainted with Hong Kong's great outdoors – plus a newish and notable boutique hotel – on a recent three-day visit.

## THE HIKES

Hong Kong Trail

(Sections 2-3) Location: The Peak and Pokfulam Country Park Length: 15-20 km (around four hours) Level: Easy to moderate

#### What is it?

The Hong Kong Trail is a 50km walking track that meanders around the forests and ridges of Hong Kong Island. It's divided into eight sections; Section 1 starts at Victoria Peak ("The Peak"), whose famous panoramas have been attracting visitors since the mid-1800s. Each section can be tackled individually or you can devise your own route that takes in several sections at a time. I did the whole of Sections 2 and 3, together with some bits of 1 and 4.

#### What's good about it?

Singapore might be one of only two cities in the world that has a rainforest within its city limits – Rio de Janeiro is the other one – yet not even it can rival Hong Kong as far as an immediate contrast between towering steel-andglass cityscapes and dense, lush forests is concerned. I was lucky enough to get a misty morning, too, which only heightened the distinction.

#### Who's doing it?

It depends on the section; close to the Peak, you'll find plenty of tourists and locals (especially couples); further along the trail, runners training for longdistance events.

#### What's at the end of it?

If, like me, you finish at the end of Section 3 or 4, you'll find yourself on the south side of Hong Kong Island. Plenty to do here: get on a junk in Aberdeen, explore up-and-coming trendy district Wong Chuk Hang, or get a bus further east to Stanley to see the markets and grab some lunch.





#### How do you get there?

You can get to the Peak on the famous Peak Tram; it's a fun start to the day. I actually walked up from Central instead – quite a steep climb, but a great way to get the heart pumping for the kilometres ahead. Lan Kwai Fong to the Peak is around 15 minutes. To get to the start of Section 2, I followed Pokfulam Reservoir Road for 10 minutes.

"Dragon's Back"

#### HONG KONG TRAIL (Sections 8)

Location: Shek O Country Park, on the eastern side of Hong Kong Island Length: 8-9 km (around three hours) Level: Easy to moderate

#### What is it?

It's been 10 years since this stunning path on top of the southeastern peninsula of Hong Kong Island was named Asia's best urban hiking trail by *Time* magazine. A lot of boots have trudged along its undulating hills since then, including around a zillion on the day I did it. It was a public holiday, though, so I should have seen it coming; you could almost hear the dragon groaning from the weight.



DRAGON'S

#### What's good about it?

Happily, the crowds don't matter. You still get glorious, unimpeded views of the South China Sea and Hong Kong Island's various bays and beaches – especially from Shek O Peak (284m).

#### Who's doing it?

Weekend sightseers, community groups, families. Try a weekday morning if you prefer a bit of solitude.



#### What's at the end of it?

The beach! There are two options: you can either stop at Big Wave Bay, known for its decent surf break, or continue on to Shek O, where families enjoying late afternoon barbecues and ball games are the order of the day. There are plenty of places to eat, drink and buy provisions at both villages.

#### How do you get there?

Easy options include driving or taking a taxi (around HK\$150 from Central). If you're relying on public transport, follow these steps:

- Go on the MTR Island Line from Central to Shau Kei Wan (20 minutes).
- Take Exit A3, then board bus 9 from Shau Kei Wan to To Tei Wan.
- The stop is 11 stops or 6km along the route, on Shek O Road near To Tei Wan village. Ask the bus driver or a fellow passenger if you're not sure where you are.

Maclehose Trail

(Section 3) Location: New Territories Length: 10km (around four hours) Level: Moderate, with a tricky ascent at the beginning



#### What is it?

The Maclehose Trail is a famous 100km walking track that cuts through the middle of Hong Kong's New Territories. The first of its 10 sections begins in the east, not far from Sai Kung, and the Trail then follows an east-west direction (with plenty of meandering) before ending up in Tuen Mun. You can tackle any or all of the sections; the prettiest is probably Section 2 with its stunning coastal views, but because I'd done that on an earlier visit, I opted for Section 3 instead.

#### What's good about it?

The Maclehose Trail is a world-class walk – and an eye-opener for anyone who equates Hong Kong with hundreds of high-rises clustered around a harbour. Highlights of Section 3 include woodlands, meadows and streams, plus several testing hills. (The first one is a real thigh-burner.) A few wild cows will block your path from time to time, adding an extra challenge.

#### Who's doing it?

Maybe I got lucky, but I didn't pass a single person on Section 3 of the trail. The inclement weather may have helped, but I think even on a good day you're going to have this part of Hong Kong largely to yourself if you make the effort to get here.

#### What's at the end of it?

Section 3 finishes kind of in the middle of nowhere, but at least there's a bus

stop on the quiet country road so you can get back to Sai Kung (bus 99, 15 minutes). Before returning to the city, grab some plates of dim sum in one of the waterfront restaurants of Sai Kung, or go on a boat trip.

#### How do you get there?

A taxi from Central would likely cost HK\$300 to \$400; public transport is your best option, though it takes around an hour.

- MTR Central to Choi Hung; change to the green line at Mong Kok (20 minutes)
- Exit C at Choi Hung, then Minibus 1A (every four minutes) to Sai Kung Pier (20 minutes)
- KMB bus 94 to Pak Tam Au bus station, start of Section 3 (20 minutes)



## THE HOTEL


Family-owned Ovolo launched in 2002 and has become one of Hong Kong's larger independent hotel and serviced apartment operators, with a half-dozen or so properties in Hong Kong and Australia. I gave their flagship hotel, Ovolo Central, a spin; here are three things that impressed me about it.

#### Freebies

If you like a hotel that exudes a spirit of generosity, you'll love Ovolo. There's free stuff galore here, including a "Loot Bag" waiting on the main console of your room. Mine was filled with packets of chips and chocolates, and a rabbit-shaped lollipop. It might only be a few dollars worth of stuff – a small percentage of the room rate (which starts at around the S\$300 mark) – yet it's still a welcome treat after half a day of international travel.

Need something to wash it all down with? The mini-bar is free, too – yes, including all the miniature bottles of spirits. And if that's not enough booze to kick-start your holiday, Ovolo's Happy Hour, 6pm to 8pm, is also free, with cold beers, wines and snacks served in the lobby.

Other freebies include daily breakfast at adjoining Café Ó – more modest than



a huge hotel buffet but still fresh and filling – and free Wi-fi, not only in the room and the public areas of the hotel, but also out and about in Hong Kong itself, via a "Y5Zone pass" that allows access in various shopping malls, coffee shops and fast food outlets.

#### Quirks

The hotel's sense of playfulness starts with the wording on the terms and conditions of the Wi-fi usage: "DO NO EVIL". It's evident in Ovolo's online presence, too: take a look at www. ovolohotels.com for a very different spin on a regular hotel website. And when I stayed over Easter, there was an inhouse competition that involved locating a pair of "bunny ears" that were stashed in your room, then putting them on, taking a photo, and Instagramming it; the prize was a night's stay at any Ovolo hotel. (There are five in Hong Kong and one in Melbourne.)

#### **Basics**

Freebies and guirks are all well and good, but often they're a ruse to hide the fact that a hotel doesn't get the simple things right. Not the case with Ovolo; it fully deserves its high TripAdvisor ranking for Hong Kong. The location is ideal: perched just above popular nightspot, Lan Kwai Fong, and within walking distance from the Airport Express station at Central, provided your bag is light enough to lug. The rooms are excellent; all have the same 35-squaremetre layout - you just choose between an Executive Suite and a "Super Shiny Room", which has more extras thrown in. And the staff are happy and helpful - not only in dealing with any issues you might have during your stay, but also before you arrive, emailing comprehensive notes about your booking, a map of how to get to the hotel, recommendations of nearby bars and restaurants, a list of Hong Kong apps you should download before your visit, and a Cantonese "survival guide". 💵

A boat safari on picturesque Koggala Lake provides a chance to view a huge array of plant and animal species, including lotuses and lilies that are highly prized in local Ayurvedic medicine, along with kingfishers and eagles, and purple-faced leaf monkeys.

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

## Attention to Prevention



This just in: the preventative HPV (human papillomavirus) vaccine, **Cervarix**, has recently been approved for a two-dose administration

for girls in Singapore aged nine to 14 years. The vaccine, meant to prevent infections caused by common cancercausing HPV types 16 and 18, has, until now, been administered only in three doses to women above the age of 15. The new dosing schedule is an alternative to the three-dose programme, with the idea of protecting more girls from cervical cancer through an easier implementation schedule.

According to doctors, cervical cancer has a wellunderstood pre-cancerous stage, unlike many other cancers, and, while screening picks up pre-cancers in women who already have HPV, preventative measures like Pap smears and vaccinations – in addition to routine screenings – are key to providing ongoing protection. 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# RUNNING COMMENTARY: Marathon Man

With the Singapore Standard Chartered Marathon just a couple of months away, **Verne Maree** talked to former elite triathlete BEN PULHAM about running a faster marathon.

en firmly believes that humans are born to run long distances. Having run "obscene amounts" as a world-class triathlete, right up to 2008 - upwards of 160km in a big week, on top of cycling and swimming - he's a poster boy for that argument. Though Ben no longer races, he now teaches others how to do it.

Fortunately for those of us who enjoy it, running is something you can probably carry on doing for a long, long time, if you train safely. "Just the other day, I heard about an 82-year-old Canadian, Ed Whitlock, who ran a 3:41 marathon! At his age, that's mind-boggling."



How long does a seasoned runner need to prepare for the marathon? To do what we call a focussed buildup, you should allow at least 16 weeks, possibly 20 if you're not very conditioned.

# When training for a marathon, distance is all-important, right?

Not exactly. At Journey Fitness Company (journeyfitnesscompany.com), we have a unique training philosophy, what we call a "smart approach". Most vital is allowing enough time for training.

We don't care so much about distance; instead, our approach is based on two key factors: time, and heart rate. When you run for the prescribed durations, and at heart rates that are optimal for you, your body will self-correct, and you'll get the training you need – be it on the flat, on a hilly course, on sand or wherever. Working on distance and pace, as most people do, is a sure-fire way to get hurt. Our way is not only very effective, it's also the safest way to train.

# How important is the weekly long, slow distance run (LSD)?

Sufficient LSD running is crucial for aerobic training, and yes, the weekly LSD run is the most important. Why? During the marathon, you get over 99 percent of your energy from your aerobic system; less than one percent comes from your anaerobic system.

Most people think they need to train their anaerobic system, that training at a fast pace will help them race faster. Actually, almost no one is limited by the speed they're able to run at; what actually holds us back is our inability to sustain that speed. To run faster, you need to improve your aerobic speed and your aerobic strength, and you'll achieve that by running within the correct heart rate zones.

### I chucked away my heart rate monitor years ago, because it told me I was working too hard – despite what I regarded as an easy pace. Was that a bad move?

Yes, it was. Like you, some of our clients do feel demoralised at first. They complain that keeping to the prescribed heart rate zone feels too slow, that they're going little faster than a walk.

We explain to them that this is a sign of an aerobic dysfunction, one that will be fixed over the course of the next few weeks. As their bodies adapt to the correct training, they will in time get a lot faster – and isn't that what we all want?

# Sounds too good to be true! Can you give us an example?

One of our clients is an ex-professional Aussie Rules player, who came to us quite fit in his own way. Having started off at a 6:30 (minutes per kilometre) pace for his long run, after a month – literally! – he was down to 5:30, at the same heart rate. Through our programme, he lost 8kg and is now doing his LSD runs at 5:00. What's more, instead of being sick all the time, he's in the peak of health.

Another good example is the 50-yearold Australian who flew in to see us a couple of years ago. At that time he was a 3:45 marathoner, so a pretty good athlete. Eighteen months later, in November 2013, he ran the New York Marathon in a cracking 3:02.

# That's phenomenal! But I'm still not clear on how the physiology works.

Simply put, the intensities you train at determine the majority of your benefit. To sustain your pace over the distance of a marathon, you need to be burning fat, not carbohydrates.

If you do your training at too high an intensity, you teach your body to burn carbohydrate and to accumulate lactate. At lower training intensities, you teach it to burn fat and to clear lactate. Our method will fix this aerobic dysfunction, enabling you to run faster, perhaps much faster, while using the same effort.

We start with a fuel-efficiency test, checking your metabolism to see what proportion of carbohydrate and fat you're burning. Then we do a lactate test, to determine the lactic acid concentration in your blood. From that, we can determine your lactate threshold and your optimal heart-rate zones, and provide you with a programme that's tailored to make you faster.

ith year-round summer weather, world-class schools, home help and a host of recreational activities for all ages, Singapore can be a kind of heaven for families. But heaven can swiftly turn into hell when illness strikes, wherever in the world you find yourself.

We are living in the tropics, after all. As I write this, two members of our editorial team are woman-down with the dreaded dengue, and a good 50 percent of us – including me – have fallen prey to the virus at some stage. Katie and Rachael are just two more to be added to the 13,208 cases recorded by the MOH in the first half of this year. Children, on the other hand, are more susceptible to hand, foot and mouth disease, which notched up 13,938 victims in the same period.

The good news? This little island is blessed with some of the best and most medically advanced health care that money can buy.

Every family needs a GP, of course, and there are thousands to choose from. To find one with an approach – both medical and cultural – that gels with your needs and beliefs, personal referral is generally the way to go.

But the health care you choose for yourself and your family doesn't have to start and end with conventional GPs, dentists and specialists, however essential they are to us. Not only more familiar modalities such as nutritional medicine, osteopathy and homeopathy are readily accessible, but perhaps less-known ones such as TCM (Chinese Traditional Medicine), too. There's a wealth of healing out there.

Here's some advice on some family-related health issues – from A for asthma to G for gestational diabetes mellitus.



# **IS FOR ASTHMA**

Little can be more distressing than the wheezing of a child who is struggling for breath. An osteopath like DAVID TIO recognises the important role of anti-

# **IS FOR BLOOD**

Blood tests may be required for all manner of ailments. While no one particularly enjoys the experience,

for a child – especially a sick child – the idea of drawing of blood via a sharp needle, not to mention the associated pain, can be frankly terrifying.

According to DR GARY KEONG KEAN SENG of Nichii International Clinic, one of the commonest reasons for doing a blood test is to assess the cause and severity of an infection in a child with fever. Occasionally, a test for electrolytes like sodium can help assess the severity of dehydration in a child with a diarrhoeal illness.

Nichii International Clinic has its own in-house phlebotomy (blood-taking) service, with doctors and nurses trained to take blood on the premises. For a harried parent with a sick child, not having to make the trip to the separate clinic or lab is a boon.

The doctor agrees that it is always a challenge to obtain a blood sample from a child. "Not only is the child afraid of pain from the needle prick," he explains, "but an unfamiliar environment – particularly if it's the child's first visit to the clinic – is enough to cause significant anxiety and distress."

"It's helpful to first establish rapport with the child and to communicate in a calm and gentle manner," says Dr Keong. "In the case of an older child, an explanation of the procedure and the reassurance of minimal discomfort is important to

# Scared of the needle?

Six ways to help your child get through it:

- Tell the truth, but keep it simple.
- Don't tell them too far in advance.
- Explain that it will help him or her get better.
- Use your iPad, a favourite story or a song to distract from the imminent prick.
- A hysterical child may be best left in the medical team's care. Step outside, or withdraw to a corner while maintaining eye contact.
- Comfort and give your child a treat, be it a lollipop or the promise of a favourite toy or activity.

allay any fears." A more anxious child may also benefit from the application of a local anaesthetic cream, typically applied 20 minutes before blood-taking.

Does the relatively smaller size of a child's blood vessels present a challenge? "Yes," he replies. "Hence the need for medical personnel like ours who are experienced with little ones."

"It's both satisfying and rewarding to treat ill children, restore their health and see them laugh and play again," says Dr Keong. "Another important part of our job is to manage their parents' concerns and expectations, and to restore calm and order to what can often be a stressful situation."

It's almost impossible to stop a child from scratching a worrisome itch – which, of course, only aggravates the problem, leading to infections (like impetigo) and even scarring. Dermatologist DR LIM KAR SENG answers a few questions.

# What are some of the more common childhood skin conditions that you see?

In babies, that would be **heat rash**. Usually presenting as red spots over the neck, back or even face, they often resolve on their own after a day or two. Occasionally, we also see **food allergies** manifesting as rashes – usually from the age of one, when the baby's diet starts expanding.

In children of primary school age, we are more likely to see skin infections such as **viral warts** or **molluscum**. These are transmitted via physical contact, probably at school. And for adolescents, **acne** represents the biggest skin issue.

# What can parents do at home? When is it time to take a rash to a doctor, and how do you treat the various childhood skin conditions?

For a **heat rash**, I'd recommend keeping the baby cool; applying moisturiser might help, too. However, for a rash that's

persistent or very recurrent – flaring up every week, say – then do see a doctor, as it may be more than a simple heat rash.

Viral warts should be treated as soon as possible, before they spread to other areas or even to the child's siblings and friends. Unfortunately, it can take a long time to get rid of persistent warts, even with medical treatment. For **molluscums** that are not actively spreading, I would advise leaving them alone and monitoring them for any change, as they often go away on their own. If you note a rapid increase in the size and number of spots, do seek medical attention, because they can spread like wildfire.

### Tell us about impetigo.

Caused by excessive scratching, impetigo is a **bacterial skin infection** that is quite common in kids between the ages of two and 10. They present with a weepy rash with yellowish discharge or crusts. Left untreated, it can spread to the other areas of the body. If the affected area is localised and superficial, treatment with a good antibacterial wash and topical preparations would suffice. However, should the infection be deeper or more widespread, then one would require oral antibiotics.

# **IS FOR DENTAL**

Many an adult has an unreasonable fear of dental treatment, often brought

on by a traumatic childhood experience. (Those brain-piercing drills were enough to put one off forever.) Thanks to today's high-tech, painless treatments, your child doesn't have to suffer in this way. Healthily functioning teeth and a lovely smile should be everyone's birthright, believes DR THEAN TSIN PIAO, and instilling good dental habits at an early age is vital.

Parents should start bringing their child to the dentist from the age of two, he says, for regular check-ups and cleaning. Depending on need, the kinds of **treatments** he provides to youngsters include everything from the extraction of baby teeth to fillings, fissure sealants, root canal treatment and even orthodontics.

Dr Thean agrees that there can be special challenges in treating a child, especially one who doesn't want to sit in

one place, or already has a fear of dentistry.

"Fear of dentistry exists in both children and adults," he says. "In these cases, good bonding, communication and trust are important in order to get the necessary treatment done. And when I'm dealing with a little one, having good parenting skills helps me to get him or her to cooperate during the process."

Ever heard of "Singapore ear"? (No, neither had we.) Ear infections are common in moist, humid environments, says ENT specialist DR JEEVE KANAGALINGAM. Let's find out more.

# The most common cause of ear pain is an infection.

This could either be a middle ear infection (*acute otitis media*) or an ear canal infection (*acute otitis externa*). Sometimes, mainly in adults and only very rarely in children, ear pain may be caused by a problem elsewhere. This "referred" pain can be caused by dental infections, inflammation of the jaw joint or arthritis of the neck.

# What are the signs of ear infection in a child?

Middle ear infections cause sudden pain, causing the child to wake up during the night, crying in distress. They may run a fever, and may tug at their ear. Ear canal infections, on the other hand, tend to come on gradually. There is usually a visible foul smelling discharge from the ear, and the ear lobe may be red and painful when touched.

**Middle ear infections are common**, and most children have a couple of infections in early childhood. Often, they follow on from a common cold, and are bacterial. Some are so mild that they may even go unnoticed!

**Ear canal infections** (*otitis externa*) can be caused by swimming – particularly long periods in the water during a beach holiday – and may be due to bacteria or fungi. Fungal ear infections are often intensely itchy and may continue for many weeks. Common in the tropics, this infection is often called "Singapore ear"!

# To treat middle ear infections that are not associated with a high fever,

recent research suggests that a good painkiller such as Ibuprofen may be most helpful. Antibiotics are often not necessary, except in children under the age of two, or in severe cases. **Ear canal infections** are best treated with antibiotic eardrops and keeping the ear as dry as possible. In severe cases, you may need to consult an ENT surgeon and have your ear canal cleaned of discharge and debris.

# Temporary hearing loss may follow a middle ear infection.

If you think your child's hearing seems poor several weeks after an infection has passed, do consult your family doctor. Glue ear (*otitis media* with effusion) is common in preschool children and can lead to speech and language delay.

# IS FOR FAMILY PRACTICE

DR CHARYU NARAYAN, who trained in paediatrics and neonatology in the UK, is now part of the international team of GPs at CHI Health.

# As a family doctor, how different is your workload in Singapore, compared with the UK?

Interestingly, it has changed from mainly chronic disease management in the UK to seeing more acute illness here, both in adults and children. Viral illnesses – coughs, colds and gastroenteritis – constitute the majority of issues at our clinic. Other common illnesses are hand, foot and mouth disease (HFMD) in younger children, and skin infections.

Children, including newborns, are seen for developmental checks, concerns from parents and for routine as well as travel vaccinations. A high fever in kids raises concern about dengue and chikungunya – both mosquito-borne illnesses found in Singapore. With in-house testing available at CHI, we are able to speed up diagnosis and management.

Influenza circulates all year round and as families travel frequently, it can be imported from their place of travel, as can typhoid and malaria.

On another note, I also frequently come across psychological issues and anxiety depression in children and adolescents. The stress of moving away from the home country, adjustment to new schools and a new culture may be responsible for these conditions becoming manifest. I must mention seeing a spectrum of eating disorders in teenage girls, too.

# Which other childhood ailments that you see are associated with living in the tropics?

Mycoplasma infection deserves a mention and presents with a cough, mild fever and fatigue lasting longer than a usual cold. Some people are able to fight off the infection without medication but I see children in whom the infection causes missed school days and low levels of energy. This group may need a course of antibiotics and follow up if they have a lung infection.

Parasitic infections and bacterial gastroenteritis cases linked to food hygiene and sanitation are often seen following holiday travel in the Subcontinent.

The absence of a winter in Singapore is a plus for asthmatic children whose symptoms are worse in cold weather, but I've observed that haze pollution triggers breathing problems in children. Dust mites – a common allergen here – are also a trigger.

# What attracted you to paediatrics and neonatology in the first place?

It's a unique branch of medicine that requires interaction with the child *and* the family. Even though it's heartbreaking to see children suffer, it's also great to see them bounce back after illness – and amazing to see them grow and develop over the years.

As physical and psychological health are so closely interwoven, a good rapport with one's paediatric patients can make all the difference in making them better. As a GP seeing children in a private practice like CHI, I have more continuity and contact with them than I would have as a hospital doctor, and I find that personally satisfying.

# **IS FOR GESTATIONAL** DIABETES

A diagnosis of gestational diabetes mellitus (GDM) is one of the *last* things a pregnant woman wants to hear, and it affects a surprising 18 percent of pregnancies. Fortunately, says endocrinologist DR FOO JOO PIN, the outcome for both mother and child can be good, as long as the mother works closely with her endocrinologist to achieve and maintain good glucose control. Early diagnosis and active intervention are key!



### What is GDM and what causes it?

GDM is defined as any degree of glucose intolerance that either starts or is first recognised during pregnancy. It happens because pregnancy-related hormonal changes cause the body to develop resistance to insulin, causing blood sugar levels to rise. If the body is unable to produce more insulin to overcome the resistance, the resistance will progressively worsen over the course of the pregnancy.

### How is it picked up?

This is a silent disorder that can only be detected via an oral glucose tolerance test. Your gynaecologist may recommend you to do the screening test, on the basis of your risk factors for diabetes. That said, many women who develop gestational diabetes have no evident risk factors. In fact, US authorities have recommended that all pregnant women be screened for gestational diabetes.

### What are the risks to mother and baby?

Left untreated, in can result in serious complications. GDM in early pregnancy can cause birth deformities in major organs such as the heart and central nervous system, and a higher risk of miscarriage. It also causes excessive growth of the baby, increasing the risk of birth trauma.

# Who might be more susceptible to GDM?

If you're overweight prior to becoming pregnant, or have a history of pre-diabetes, or a family history of diabetes, or previously gave birth to a big baby or a stillborn baby, your chances are higher.

### How is it treated?

Treating GDM involves dietary and lifestyle intervention. Very often, though, insulin is required to control the blood sugars to optimal levels. Many women have a fear of injecting insulin, but they shouldn't – modern insulin therapy can be really easy, convenient and pain-free nowadays.

# AT HOME WITH SUZY WALSHAM - ONWARDS AND UPWARDS!

Especially upwards! During the more than eight years she has lived in Singapore, SUZY WALSHAM has won many of our top road races multiple times. But it's her achievements in the burgeoning field of stair-racing that are really putting her on the global map, as **Verne Maree** found out when she visited the friendly Aussie at her home on the 30th floor of an East Coast condo.

In fact, Suzy is the record-breaking fifth-time winner of the gruelling Empire State Building Run-up, the world's most famous stair-race.

"She only married me because I had an apartment in one of Singapore's tallest residential blocks," grins Suzy's husband David. That can't be the only reason, I think to myself; he makes a great cup of coffee, too. They started dating about six years ago when they both worked for Symantec, she as an accountant and he in a sales role; and she moved in with him when they became engaged two years later.

*Expat Living* showcased this big, airy apartment way back in 2007, as David reminds me. Its beguiling view of sea and ships is completely unblocked — so rare. "My décor consultant agreed that I didn't really need a water feature," he jokes.

Six months after the birth of their son, who is now 4, Suzy returned to work on a part-time basis. "It's hard to juggle work with family," she agrees, "especially as David travels a lot." It helps that much of what she does is global project work, and so fairly flexible.

"Unfortunately," she adds, "my son is not a good sleeper. If it were not for my amazing helper, I would not be able to train the way I do."

### What distances do you run?

For me, the 10K feels like a marathon, because I'm actually a middle-distance track runner, having started athletics at the age of seven. I'd never even raced 10K until I moved to Singapore for my work in 2006, shortly after running for Australia in the Commonwealth Games.

Nowadays, I'm trying to fit road races around my stairracing, and with so many races on the local calendar, there



are sometimes clashes. My first race here was the very first Great Eastern Women's 10K, which I won.

I also won the Standard Chartered 10K in 2006 and 2007, and the half-marathon in 2008. I was injured in 2009, and pregnant in 2010. Last year, it clashed with the lucrative Hong Kong ICC stair-race, which was also the final of the Vertical World Circuit; and it's the same this year, so I won't be taking part.

So far this year, I've done the Hong Bao 8K, the 2XU Compression Run 10K, the JP Morgan Corporate Challenge (5.6K), and the NTUC 10K and the Shape 5K on 17 August. I'll be doing the Great Eastern 10K in November, too.

### What do you like about stair-racing?

I'm quite injury-prone, and racing on the stairs suits me because there's less impact. It's more strength-based, and I can do it even if I am injured.

It's great that there's now a world circuit, and because I'm doing well I get invited to a lot of races; this gives me the opportunity to travel, often with sponsored flights or accommodation.

# Why do you think there's such a growing interest in stair-racing?

It's something different, and it's something anyone who lives or works in a high-rise building can relate to. But it won't be a spectator sport until they bring in cameras and real-time timing facilities.

As most stair races are done in time-trial format, you don't even know who has won until after the race organisers have worked it all out. A few, like the Empire State Building in New York, are pack-starts – which the media love as it's easy to identify the winner. For safety reasons, there are generally no more than ten élite competitors at the start.

In 2009, however, I got slammed into a wall at the start of the New York race and remained injured for most of the rest of the year. That's the most famous stair-race of them all, though, so I'm glad I went back, and I was delighted to win it this year for a record-breaking fifth time.

### Where else does stair-racing take you?

There's the SkyRun Messe Turm in Frankfurt, the ICC building in Hong Kong, the Shangri-La in Beijing, and the new Torch Hotel in Doha. They've also resurrected the Sydney Tower Run, which is a really odd race: you're going right up the middle of the tower, next to the lift.

Also challenging is the big one in Bogota, Colombia, which attracts about 5,000 participants. Here, the altitude is the real killer: you're 2,700 metres above sea level even before you start climbing! Just carrying my bag through the airport, I was struggling for breath. I'm not very good at altitude.

# You've won the Singapore Vertical Marathon up the 76-storey Swissôtel eight times, right?

Yes. It's not the highest – I complete it in just under eight minutes, compared with about 12 minutes for the Empire State Building.

Being right-handed, I'm stronger on a clockwise staircase. Luckily, I have a friend who lives at another high condo on the East Coast, where I can train anti-clockwise; and another who lives at a condo that's more than 60 storeys high, for a longer climb.

For a professional stair-climber, living in Singapore is a big advantage. My friends in Europe often have to train on a 20-storey building, and need to travel a long way even for that.

### When and how do you train?

I start at 5.30am, before the family wakes up. Getting my son ready for school adds on at least half an hour to my morning; it's always: "Just five minutes more with my trains, Mum!" It's a constant negotiation. I'm not getting enough sleep to recover properly from training, and I must admit I'm exhausted right now.

Because I'm injury-prone, I'm doing more cross-training: twice a week in the condo gym. I train on the stairs twice a week, and I run three or maybe four times a week, including a Sunday morning 17K. The flatness of East Coast Park suits me, but I also like Bedok Reservoir, because of the gravel surface; it's easier on the joints and it's well marked.

For a hill session, I like to go to Mount Faber. I pass the cyclists sometimes, and it's fun to see the look on their faces!

In honour of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, we asked gynaecologist and obstetrician, DR CHRISTOPHER NG of GynaeMD Women's and Rejuvenation Clinic, to educate us on the terrible disease and how we can detect it as early as possible.

### What are the risk factors for breast cancer?

They include family history (inherited mutated genes), personal history, increasing age, obesity, alcohol consumption, radiation exposure, early menarche and late menopause, having your first child after the age of 35, having never been pregnant, and excessive hormonal exposure – especially women who undergo hormone replacement therapy (HRT) for longer than five years after menopause. Any woman is at risk of developing breast cancer, but those with these risk factors are in greater danger.

### What are the symptoms that women should look out for?

Breast lumps, skin changes, including pitting and dimpling, change in breast shape, bloody nipple discharge and nipple inversion.

# What's a mammogram?

During a mammogram, each breast is compressed between two plates to flatten and spread the tissue for a few seconds. Though



it can be uncomfortable for a moment, it's necessary in order to produce a good quality, readable mammogram.

The goal of mammography is to detect breast cancer, and in the earliest stage possible; when caught early, localised cancers can be removed without resorting to mastectomy (breast removal).

# What forms of screening are used to diagnose breast cancer?

The most effective and proven method to detect breast cancer early is an X-ray of the breasts, or mammogram, and this can be combined with an ultrasound scan of the breast in some cases. Women are also encouraged to examine their own breasts on a monthly basis, after their periods have ended – although this is not considered as accurate as mammography.

# So, how often should women undergo mammograms, and at what age should they start?

Women aged 40 and above should go for a screening mammogram once a year until they reach menopause, after which screening mammograms are recommended every two years.

# The Age Quandary

In recent years, there has been controversy over when and how often women should go for mammograms – while some cancer doctors argue that yearly mammograms are only necessary for women above 50, other experts maintain that mammograms should be performed from the age of 40.

Nevertheless, the majority of doctors agree that women under 40 do not need yearly mammograms unless they're at high risk, with strong family histories of breast or ovarian cancers. In fact, according to Cancer Research UK, mammograms are more difficult to read in younger women because their breast tissue is denser. There's also little evidence that regular mammograms for most women under 40 reduces deaths from breast cancer.

# BREAST CANCER AWARENESS

# What preventative steps, if any, can be taken?

Maintain a healthy weight and lifestyle, limit alcohol consumption and avoid overexposure to long-term hormonal therapies; women can go on HRT to relieve their menopausal symptoms, as long as it's for less than five years. Those women with a very strong family history of breast cancer who have tested positive for the breast cancer gene mutation may choose to undergo a prophylactic mastectomy; they may also choose to have their healthy ovaries removed (prophylactic oophorectomy) to reduce the risk of both breast and ovarian cancers once they have reached menopause.

Dr Na recommends that, in addition to breast screenings, women should have a general screening once a year for peace of mind, and for the early prevention or detection of any diseases. His clinic offers a GynaeMD Pelvis, Breast and Bone Package for women 40 and above, and for those who are menopausal; the package involves a pelvis ultrasound, mammogram and blood cancer markers, and an evaluation of bone mass density. According to Dr Ng, this examination is very beneficial in that it allows for any benign breast lumps or cysts to be observed; if they appear suspicious, they can be removed or the patient can be referred to a breast surgeon for a second opinion; similarly, any fibroids and cysts that are discovered can be monitored.

# **Check Yourself**

Whether or not women should do breast self-exams has become a subject of debate in recent years, as the issue of accuracy has been called into question. However, one thing's for sure: the more aware of your body you are, the more likely you are to notice if something's out of the ordinary, and potentially harmful. It's important to know how your breasts normally look and feel, and being in the habit of checking for any abnormalities can be a valuable means of keeping tabs on your breast health, even if you do visit the doctor for regular exams. According to John Hopkins Medicine, 40 percent of diagnosed breast cancers are detected by women who feel a lump, so establishing a regular breast self-exam routine is crucial. # The Stats

- According to World Cancer Research Fund International, breast cancer is the most common cause of cancer-related deaths among women globally, with more than 450,000 deaths each year, and accounting for about 14 percent of all female cancer deaths.
- According to the Health Promotion Board, breast cancer is the most common cancer among Singaporean women.
- Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer among Australian women, according to the National Breast Cancer Foundation in Australia. It's estimated that, in 2014 alone, 15,270 women in Australia will be diagnosed with the disease.
- According to Cancer Research UK, the lifetime risk of being diagnosed with breast cancer is one in eight for women in the UK, where it's the most common form of cancer. The same goes for women in the US, says the American Cancer Society (ACS).
- The ACS projects that around 232,670 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in the US this year, and about 62,570 new cases of carcinoma in situ (the earliest form of breast cancer) will be detected; sadly, an estimated 40,000 women will die this year from the disease in the US.
- Although breast cancer is often thought to be a disease of the developed world, almost 50 percent of breast cancer cases and 58 percent of deaths occur in less developed countries, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO).
- In 2012, Belgium had the highest incidence of breast cancer, followed by Denmark, France and The Netherlands, according to World Cancer Research Fund International.
- According to WHO, breast cancer survival rates vary greatly worldwide, ranging from 80 percent or more in North America, Sweden and Japan, to around 60 percent in middle-income countries and below 40 percent in low-income countries, mainly due to a lack of early detection programmes in less advanced countries.



Breast cancer screening has been a source of controversy for decades, with some medical experts and patients guestioning whether the benefits of mammography outweigh the risks. Currently, most women use mammography as their main form of routine screening, while other methods like magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) are typically conducted only for further evaluation, or in conjunction with mammography, particularly for those women at high risk. Though most major health organisations have concluded that mammography is a valuable screening tool, others maintain that MRI is more effective and should be primarily conducted even for those women with an average risk of developing breast cancer. Here's a look at the not-so-blackand-white debate.

### Density and false negatives

The debate over the age at which women should start screening for breast cancer is controversial, partly because younger women have denser breasts, which makes it difficult to interpret mammograms in women below 50, or below menopausal age. After menopause, the breast's glandular tissue is replaced by fatty tissue, making mammographic interpretations more accurate. As a result, mammography isn't generally considered an effective technique for younger women.

The age issue aside, women with denser breasts are usually encouraged to undergo MRI or ultrasound screenings as mammograms don't always pick up cancers hidden by the dense tissue, producing false negatives – when mammograms appear normal even though breast cancer is present, creating a false sense of security and a possible delay in cancer diagnosis.

While it's true that MRI has been shown to rule out the presence of cancer to a high degree of certainty, making it an excellent tool for screening - particularly for patients at high genetic risk or those with dense tissue - many experts point out that MRI can miss some cancers that would be detected by mammography; while MRI is considered to be more sensitive, mammography is considered to be more specific. Breast surgeon Dr Georgette **Chan**, for instance, recommends MRI scans only in combination with mammograms for certain groups of patients, including young women with dense breasts, those with a strong family history of breast cancer and those with breast implants.

According to Dr Chan, recent advances in the field of mammography make the screening process even more effective. One example is **3D mammography** (tomosynthesis), which is an extension of a digital mammogram. "The breast is compressed once and the machine takes many low-dose x-rays as it moves over the breast," she explains. "Then, the images are combined to give a three-dimensional picture. This method uses more radiation than the standard two-view mammogram, but it may see problem areas more clearly and may possibly find more cancers."

# **False positives**

Some medical experts and patients feel that, when taking into account the frequency of false positives – when mammogram findings that look like cancer turn out to be benign – and the potential for causing unnecessary distress, the risks of mammography offset the benefits. This is because many women who receive false positive results become upset and fearful about the possibility of having breast cancer, and must return for anxiety-inducing follow-ups and testing.

On the other hand, this may be outweighed by the possibility of detecting cancer in its early stages. According to Cancer Research UK, many women understand that mammography is likely to pick up cancers at an early stage when treatments work best, and they find having regular screenings reassuring.

In addition, many experts note that, while mammography may not be perfect, MRI is not a perfect tool either. According to Dr Chan, MRI scans create more false positive results than mammograms do, because the scans are more detailed. "There is a lot of overlap between normal and abnormal tissue," she says. "Even the timing of the scan in relation to the menstrual cycle can make a difference because of the hormonal influence. More false-positive results may mean more unnecessary biopsies and patient anxiety."

### **Over-diagnosis**

Also central to the debate is the concern of over-diagnosing early cancers and unnecessarily treating tumours that wouldn't have affected a woman's health during her lifetime. Since there's no way to tell which cases of cancer will go on to become invasive breast cancer, causing illness or death, almost all cancers are treated, which means some women are unnecessarily treated, or "over-treated", with radiation and invasive procedures.

### Radiation

Like normal x-rays, mammography uses ionising radiation to create images that are then analysed for any abnormalities. According to the US-based Susan G. Komen cancer organisation, while the radiation exposure during mammography can increase the risk of breast cancer over time, this increase in risk is very small. Nevertheless, the concern over exposure to small doses remains, and it's up to the individual to make that choice for herself.

# Other considerations

Many women refuse an MRI based on the claustrophobic sensation, and the length of time the procedure takes. According to Dr Chan, MRI scans are more uncomfortable, as the patient must lie on her belly for 30 to 45 minutes, as opposed to a few minutes of discomfort during a mammogram. She also notes that MRI requires an intravenous injection of a dye via IV for better visualisation, making it more of an invasive procedure. However, some feel that MRI is less uncomfortable than mammography – it really depends on one's own comfort level.

### To each her own

The verdict? It's still complicated. It's true that there is growing evidence that breast MRI in combination with mammography, compared with mammography alone, can increase detection of breast cancer in certain women at high risk; and although there are some risks involved with mammography, forgoing mammograms altogether can be risky. In the end, however, it really comes down to each individual speaking with her doctor and weighing the benefits and risks based on her specific circumstances, including her genetic risk of cancer and her breast density, among other factors.

### SURGICAL TREATMENTS FOR BREAST CANCER

According to Dr Chan, most patients begin their treatment with surgery. "The goal is to remove the cancer and check the lymph node status in the axilla, or armpit," she says. "The tumour profile needs to be studied to individualise other therapies that may be required following surgery. The type of surgery really depends on the size and the position of the tumour."

For small tumours, a wide excision of the tumour - known as **breast-conserving surgery** - can be done.

followed by several weeks of radiation treatment. "The advantage here is that the majority of the normal remaining breast can be preserved," says Dr Chan.

For larger tumours, on the other hand, or those involving the nipple, conserving the breast may not always be possible. In this case, a **mastectomy** (breast removal) may be a safer bet. "Usually, patients who have undergone a mastectomy do not require further radiation therapy," she says.

### **RECONSTRUCTIVE SURGERY**

For patients who need a mastectomy, Dr Chan says she usually offers breast reconstruction surgery, which aims to rebuild the breast mound. In fact, she says, 80 to 90 percent of her mastectomy patients opt for breast reconstruction, which can be done either at the time of the mastectomy or a few months after chemotherapy or radiation therapy has been completed.

"Reconstruction not only physically rebuilds the breast mound – making it easier for the patient to wear her clothes and even a swimsuit – but it also rebuilds her self-confidence and does wonders for her self-image," says Dr Chan.

# If a woman's not exercising regularly before she's pregnant, should she start during pregnancy?

In most cases, absolutely! There is no time in a woman's life where she will benefit more from being fit and active than during pregnancy, and her childbearing years in general. Pregnancy is not a disease, and women shouldn't spend nine months treating it as such. In fact, it's recommended that pregnant women get at least 30 minutes of exercise per day, which can usually be continued right up until labour. Though exercise can be more challenging during pregnancy, the benefits for both mother and child can far outweigh any potential negative side effects.

# So, what are the advantages?

Common pregnancy-related complaints of fatigue, lower extremity swelling and circulatory problems are reduced with exercise. Also, exercise can prevent excessive maternal weight gain, improve blood sugar control in women with gestational diabetes and even play a role in the prevention of gestational diabetes. Remaining fit and active helps a woman maintain her cardiovascular fitness and strength, which will benefit her during labour. In fact, there's some evidence that weight-bearing exercise during pregnancy can reduce the length of labour and decrease delivery complications. In addition, pelvic floor exercises during pregnancy, and in the immediate postpartum period, may reduce the risk of future urinary incontinence.

And don't underestimate the psychological benefits of getting active, and taking control of your health and your pregnancy. Psychologically, active women experience less insomnia, stress anxiety and depression.

# What does the FitBumps programme involve?

Radiance FitBumps is a flexible, group-based course for pregnant women who wish to increase their knowledge of all things pregnancy, exercise and physio-related. The programme includes a bootcamp with 60 minutes of physio-led exercises designed to make mums-to-be sweat, as well as whole body strength training, low-impact aerobic-style exercises and core-based Pilates-style movements. Since hormonal changes lead to an increase in joint laxity and hypermobility, we designed the exercises to strengthen muscles without placing extra stress on joints.

The course also involves weekly, 30-minute educational talks on different topics, including back care and pelvic floor and postpartum exercises, with take-home materials.

# KATHERINE'S tips

- Wear comfortable clothing that will help you remain cool
- Wear a bra that fits well and gives lots of support
- Drink plenty of water to help keep you from overheating and dehydrating
- Make sure you consume the extra daily calories you need during pregnancy
- Empty your bladder before exercising; the combination of increased fluid intake and the pressure of an enlarged uterus can lead to urinary incontinence

### Tell us about your trip to the Gothia Youth World Cup in Sweden.

Our trip to Gothenburg was amazing. JSSL sent nine teams, making us the largest international club from outside Europe to compete there. We played our first matches on the Monday and won all of our group stages with scores like 11-0 and 5-2. By Thursday, we'd reached the quarterfinals, which was where we'd been knocked out the previous year; we were really determined to get past that point this time. We ended up winning and moved on to the semis the next day, where we played a Canadian team and won again, pushing us all the way to the finals.

On Friday, we played the finals in a small stadium, which was an incredible experience. There was a great turnout – and great support – from all the JSSL Arsenal teams that attended. Unfortunately, we lost against a Swedish academy; they were amazing. Even though we didn't win, everyone went home smiling because we all knew that we had just come second in the world's biggest junior football competition against 41 girls' teams from all over the world.

# That must have been very exciting. How much did you have to practise for the tournament?

Our regular training is two days a week, but for Gothia we practised for two hours, four times a week. Closer to the competition, we trained for three hours, five times a week.

# What's your favourite part about playing in the JSSL leagues, and what do you love most about your team?

I love playing on a girls' team with such talented, lovely players; not to mention our amazing coach, Coach Gavin, who was the reason we made it to the finals in Gothia. I have learnt so much since I first joined, and am a completely different player now.

What I love most about my team is that they are all so supportive and friendly. We train hard, but also have lots of fun – and if I let in a goal they don't blame me or get upset. We play well as a supportive team, and that really brings us together both on and off the pitch.

# What else do you like to do for fun?

Aside from loads and loads of football, I love to play basketball. I'm really into my sports, but I always love a good day out with my friends.

Before he can gloop us a third time, we find the only dignified solution we can think of. We rub the excess gloop off on our shirts and make a desperate sprint for the MRT.

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
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
